ECONOMY

THE OREGONIAN in a recent issue, commenting on a statement of principles made by Dr. Withycombe, said:

"Economy is given primary consideration in his statement of principles. He holds that the present burden of taxation is out of proportion to the taxable wealth of the state, and urges the elimination of extravagance in all forms and a careful, efficient administration of state affairs as the remedy."

And quotes from the Doctor's statement after he spoke of the necessity of good roads as follows:

"Of equal importance is the cost of constructing these roads, a cost which may grow out of proportion to the value of a specified road. There must be an equitable method of placing the cost of good roads, and, above all, there must be insisted upon a system of highway construction which will give a dollar's worth of road for every dollar expended."

These principles are particularly applicable to Klamath county at the present time. Economy in public affairs is the demand of the times everywhere, and nowhere is it more necessary than in this county after the extravagant management of the last four years, during which time the county debt has increased about \$400,000, notwithstanding the enormous sums of money collected from the taxpayers and spent during the same period.

It will be for the voters to determine by their votes on November 3 whether or not they want this extravagant management to continue or not.

RIVERS ARE STILL CLOSED

IT'S LUMBERING to be abandoned by the mills purchasing timber on the Klamath Indian reservation? is a question that many are asking, looking back to a year of unsuccessful endeavor to secure the re-opening of Williamson and Sprague rivers to logging. It has been about a year since the matter first came to the attention of Klamath Falls people, and since that time every conceivable agency has been brought into play in the hope of securing the opening.

These rivers, which are the natural means for transporting the logs from the woods to the mills at Chiloquin, were closed to logging by the bureau of Indian affairs, after a petition had been sent in by some sportsmen and Indians, protesting that the driving of logs would interfere with the trout fishing. Strenuous efforts have been made to have the rivers re-opened, but so far in vain.

The matter was taken up by the Klamath Chamber of Commerce; by the county republican and democrat central committees; through personal letters to influential people in the East and West; through the Oregon delegation in congress; through telegrams, letters and petitions to the Department of the Interior and Indian bureau; through commercial clubs all over Oregon and California—but logging on the rivers is as much barred today as a year ago. In the spring a promise was made by Indian Commissioner Cato Sells that he would make a personal investigation. Spring came, but no Mr. Sells, instead a telegram that he would be here during the summer. This in turn was followed by a telegram stating that the commissioner would be here early in the fall.

After Sells telegraphed that he would be here, the local campaigning ceased, for it was felt that what was needed was about accomplished. But now winter is fast approaching, and as yet nothing has been done.

The Chamber of Commerce has again taken up the matter with Secretary Lane, in the hope of getting some action taken. It would be well for every person interested in the future of this section to make some effort

in the hope that by spring this great injustice to our lumber interests will be corrected and the mills at Chiloquin can all run full blast.

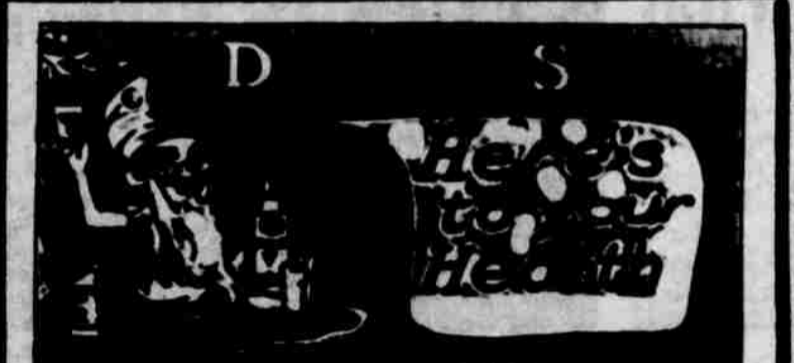
