

AT THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH

The last two evenings Mr. Swander has preached at the Christian church on the subject "The Church That is Jesus Built," and treated it in a very unique manner. A large chart upon the wall represented the church in the scriptural illustrations of a building, a kingdom and a human body. As a building he spoke of the essential, a foundation, a material, a door. In the church, he declared, Christ was the builder, the foundation was composed of the apostles, prophets and Jesus Christ, the material was believers in Jesus Christ, and the door was Christ. As a kingdom, Mr. Swander said that the church was a chartered form of government, and not constitutional. It has for a basis of authority a charter from God, and not a constitution framed by man. Human creeds are constitutions. The essentials for a kingdom are a king, subjects, laws and a naturalization process. These are found as follows: Christ is the king, redeemed men are the subjects, Christ's words are the laws, and the plan of pardon is the naturalization process. As a human body the church has certain essentials. It must have a head, a trunk, members and senses.

The counterpart in the church is Christ as the head, the official organization for the trunk, redeemed men for the members, and the inspired writers for the senses. Churches today that measure up to these essentials are like the church that Jesus built.

Notice Inviting Proposals to Purchase City of Klamath Falls Improvement Bonds.

Sealed proposals will be received by the undersigned until Thursday, November 12, 1914, at the hour of 9 o'clock p. m. of said day, at the city hall in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, (and at such time and place all proposals received will be opened) for the purchase of \$25,021.15 city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, coupon improvement bonds, payable ten years from date of issue, bearing a rate of interest not to exceed six per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable at the office of the city treasurer or at the fiscal agency of the state of Oregon, in New York, principal and interest payable in gold coin of the United States of America. Said bonds will be issued in denominations not exceeding \$500 each, and numbered from one to ... inclusive. Said bonds are authorized by Ordinance No. 341 of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, for the purpose of providing funds to pay the cost of improving parts of the following named streets, to-wit:

Eighth street, from Main street to High street; High street, from Eighth to Ninth street; Ninth street, from High to Prospect street; Prospect street, from Ninth to Upham street; Upham street, from Prospect street to White avenue, and White avenue, from Upham street to Delta street, including intersections.

Said bonds will be sold to the highest bidder for cash, and for not less than their par value and accrued interest.
