THAT "FITILESS PUBLICITY"

WHEN the democratic adminis-
tration came into power,
March, 1912, it loudly proclaimed
that its watchword would be "Fitiless
Publicity."

The democrats at last were to let
the people look into all the daily op-
erations of the government at Wash-
ington. There was to be no secrecy.
Everything was to be public; every-
thing was to be free.

Here was to be a great new adminis-
tration that would at last let the
light of day shine into the dark cor-
ners of governmental functions.

The only trouble with the democra-
tic program was that the democra-
ts never lived up to it. Instead of
opening up closed doors, they care-
fully went around and locked the doors
that were open, and then threw the
keys away.

If they found a light burning in
some dark corner they quickly turned
it out.

"Fitiless Publicity" has long since
become a by-word of derision among
the Washington newspaper men.

It is "Sinister Secreciveness" now,
under democratic rule. From the
president down, there has been a
careful campaign of secrecy.

Probably the smart flower of this
wonderful school of publicity bloo-
some is the state department and
Secretary William Jennings Bryan.
His apologists set up the plea that the
international affairs of the govern-
ment must be carried on entirely in
secret.

Yet Mr. Bryan's predecessors have
never hesitated to discuss them frank-
ly and openly with the newspaper cor-
respondents.

The real secret is that men like
John Hay and Elihu Root could trust
themselves to discuss matters of in-
ternational law in public.

ONE WAY OUT OF IT

A MIGHTY ground swell of "Vote
No" sentiment is reported to
be gaining momentum in every part
of Oregon.

Disgusted with the great mass of
indigestible amendments and bills on
the ballot, and alarmed for fear that
many of them will prove absolutely
destructive of the commercial pros-
perity of the state, the people seem
determined to vote "No" on all but a
very few measures that are known to
possess genuine merit, and for which
there is a very general demand.

That the attempt to put over radical
legislation of any kind at the
election November 24 will fail, is now
very generally conceded all over the
state.

AT THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH

There was one response to the in-
vitation at the Christian church last
night. The audience was good. Mr.
Swander spoke on "The Second Com-
ing of Christ." He said in part:

"The disciples could not under-
stand why Jesus should go away from
them, but there were reasons. He
was going to prepare a place for
them (John 14:2). This earth is
not our home, but a place of sojour-
ning. Then he went as a matter of
expediency, for the Comforter could
not come except he went (John 16:7).
Then again it was essential for him
to go away for the sake of the evan-
gelization of the world. Had he
stayed the disciples would have want-
ed to stay with him, instead of going
to the uttermost parts of the earth.

"The early church looked for a
speedy return, and Paul mentions it
frequently in his epistles. Some have
gone so far as to set dates, notably
Wm. Miller in 1843, and Pastor Rus-
sell in 1914. But Jesus said that no
man knows the day or the hour, so
we may rest assured that dates that
may be given are false alarms.

"But there is a certainty that he
will come again. Jesus promised it,
the angels promised it, Paul taught it.

"Another remarkable testimony
comes from the tabernacle service.
The high priest went into the Holy
of Holies to make atonement for
Israel, but the atonement was not
complete until he comes out again.

Police Station as
Employment Agencies

CHICAGO, Oct. 23.—Use of police
stations as employment agencies and
establishment of a central municipal
employment bureau operated on the
lines of the one opened in Milwaukee
three years ago, will be discussed at
a conference of the municipal mar-
kets commission, handling the unem-
ployment problem, and a number of
the labor leaders of today.

Miss Amelia Sears, head of the
county bureau of public welfare,
made the suggestion that police sta-
tions be turned into employment

agencies during the winter. She
said that aside from the direct bene-
fits of this new departure, the police
and jobless men would be brought
into closer sympathy and lose some
of the spirit of antagonism.

A canvass of 1,000 of the largest
industrial concerns in Chicago is
about completed, and will be turned
over to the markets commission. The
canvass will show labor prospects for
Chicago for the winter months, and
indicate to charitable societies to
what extent their aid will be neces-
sary.
