Vote for the Southern Oregon State Normal school, general election November 2, 1914.

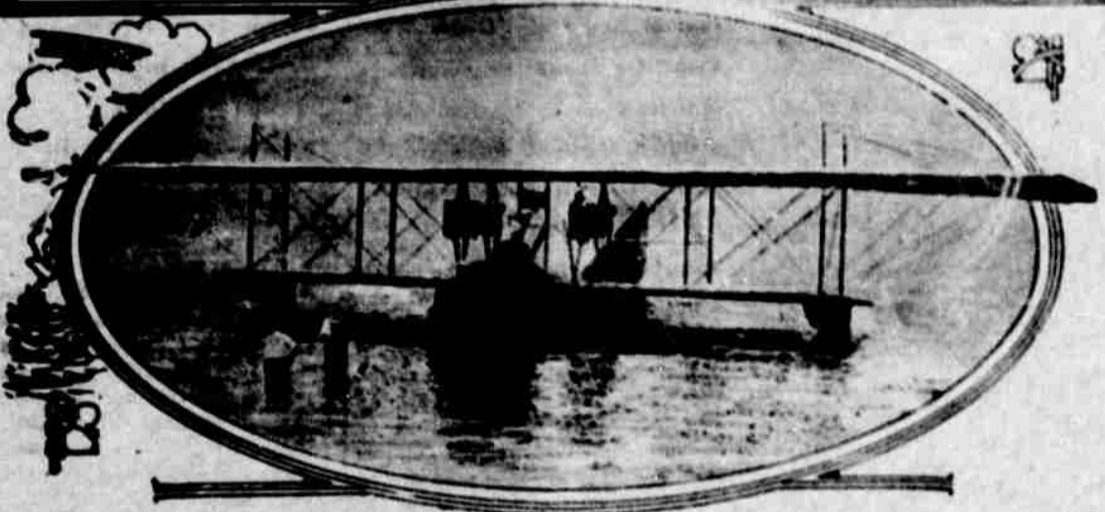
Scattered Shots

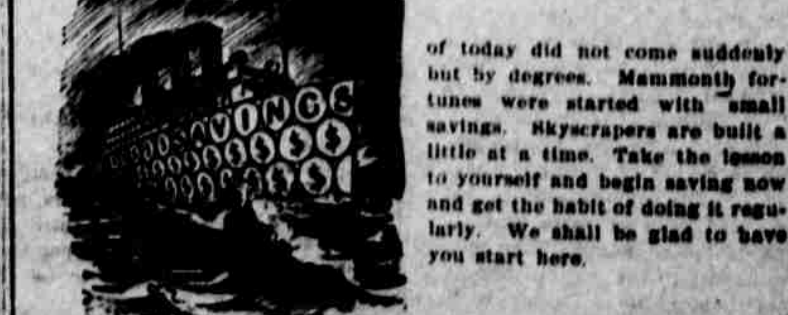
