## A QUESTION OF POLICY

**A** CCEPTING the recent decision of  
the supreme court that all coun-  
ty judges elected in 1910 hold office  
for six years as final, the people of  
Klamath county, nevertheless, will  
still have the opportunity to go to  
the polls next Tuesday and express  
the policy which they wish the county  
court to be governed by in the future  
handling of county business.

With the personal factor eliminat-  
ed in their vote for county judge, the  
voters can, without prejudice or harm  
to anyone, say emphatically whether  
they desire a continuance of what we  
will mildly call the extravagance of  
the past four years, or whether they  
want the county placed on a sound  
financial basis, where its warrants  
cannot be questioned by friend or  
foe, and where the county will re-  
ceive a dollar's worth of service for  
every dollar expended.

There should be no sentiment in  
the vote on county judge. It is purely  
a cold-blooded business propo-  
sition.

If you believe it is good business  
for the county to be plunged into debt  
for another half million dollars, you  
should vote to endorse the present  
county judge. If you do not want  
him to follow the policy he has pur-  
sued in the past in spending your  
money, you should say so by voting  
against Judge Worden. The only  
natural conclusion he could arrive at,  
in case he received a majority of the  
votes, is that you desire him to con-  
tinue in his lavish expenditure of  
money. It is up to the voters to de-  
cide.

A Ton of Ammunition  
to Every Man Killed

For every man killed in battle one  
ton of cannon balls is required. Al-  
though this was an old theory in the  
days of the flintlocks and muzzle-load-  
ers, it is a known fact today.

General Rohne of the German  
army has proved this to be true by a  
careful study of statistics on the bat-  
tle of Kia Chau, which preceded the  
siege of Port Arthur, during the Rus-  
so-Japanese war.

In this battle the Russians killed  
were 1,475 officers and men. The Jap-  
anese lost numbered 4,204 officers  
and men. The Japanese discharged  
40,150 cannon shots and 4,000,000  
rifle cartridges, while the Russian  
forces fired 736,000 rifle cartridges  
and 7,750 cannon shots.

Eighteen per cent of the losses  
were caused by artillery and 82 per  
cent by small arms. According to  
General Rohne, it took 165 cannon  
balls or 214 cartridges to kill each  
Japanese, and 151 cannon shots or  
3,330 rifle cartridges to kill each Rus-  
sian.

The cannon balls used by the Jap-  
anese had an average weight of 142  
pounds 5 ounces, and the rifle car-  
tridges discharged by them weighed  
142 grains.

Therefore it appears that about  
2,200 pounds of steel and lead in the  
form of cannon balls, or 7 pounds in  
the form of cartridges, was required  
to kill each Russian lost in that  
battle.

## Railroad Arrives via Steamer

The first shipment of steel rails for  
the Coos Bay end of the Willamette-  
Pacific railway has reached Coos Bay  
and is today being unloaded on scows  
for transportation to the Sand Point  
district. The consignment of steel  
rails amounted to 500 tons, which is  
equivalent to three miles of railroad.  
It is stated this will be laid on the  
grade out northward from Sand Point  
at once to provide means of transpor-  
tation along that district for con-  
struction material and other neces-

## New Pump for Project

The matter of getting water on the  
land in the Paradise project has tak-  
en a new turn. A short time ago a  
man by the name of Bobo came here  
from California and has interested  
the land owners in a new style pump,  
which he perfected, and which he says  
can be used to advantage on their  
land. He has one in operation on a  
ranch which he owns in California,  
and it consists of an auger which  
runs the entire length of the pipe,  
and which is operated by a pulley at  
the top. His well is 900 feet deep,  
and has a six-inch pipe. The water  
is forced to the top by means of the  
auger, and a tremendous flow is pos-  
sible. According to his statement he  
irrigates 160 acres with this one well.
