Students Bring Games Back to Rival Cities

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Oct. 25—The "psychological moment," that much-abused term, has been nevertheless the cause of a serious eruption

When plans had been practically completed for the staging of the Oregon-O. A. C. game in Portland, one contract already signed and another on the verge of it

The setting was placed. For several weeks the general impression was abroad in Eugene and Portland, promoted through the Portland newspapers

A. R. Tiffany, student body manager, had given out the impression that it was practically left to O. A. C. to decide, but he did not make a definite statement

The students had been quietly discussing the game and where it was to be played. Nothing had been done to

arouse their ire and feelings, and the question had not been put to an issue. Reports that came from reliable sources at Corvallis said that similar conditions prevailed at Corvallis among the students

A movement was launched in Eugene questioning the rights of the authorities to take the game to Portland. Not only the rights, but also the justice to the students and all concerned were made part of the issue

Those in charge of athletics at the colleges had gone to Portland. The game had been under discussion by the students and the dormant sentiment was to have the game on the campus. This Eugene action started the movement, and in fifteen minutes representatives of 150 students had gathered together and voiced their protest

A telephone call to O. A. C. started the movement there, when they learned of the actions of the Oregon students. A similar meeting was held there before nightfall by representatives of a large number of students. These resulted in mass meetings at both institutions demanding that the game be put on the campus of one or the other colleges

It was a case wherein student body sentiment had not been reckoned with by the athletic councils in the two schools. At the climax, when the contracts were soon to be signed, the students were awakened from their lethargy through the Morning Register columns. Immediate action was secured

The game will be played in Corvallis this year on November 21, and in Eugene next year

VISITORS SAY TEAM IS GAME
