BIG AND SMALL MEN

JUDGE WORDEN says that Marion Hanks would have been the biggest man in Klamath county if he had withdrawn from the race for county judge and deprived the people of the county of the privilege and opportunity of publicly expressing their disapproval of the manner in which county business has been handled in the past four years.

This may be Judge Worden's personal opinion, but we are constrained to believe that the majority of the people of Klamath county do not see the matter in the same light. It was the duty of Mr. Hanks to remain in the race, in order that an honest expression of the wishes of the people could be had.

When you stop to think of it, it takes a pretty big man who is willing to continue through the natural bitterness of a political campaign when he knows there is no hope of personal success, simply as a matter of principle, and because he places duty above personal interests. The easiest and cheapest plan for Mr. Hanks, of course, would have been to quit. A man who only considers his own personal interests might have done so, but the man who places principle and duty first should be commended.

We voice the expression of hundreds of people in Klamath county, including friends and supporters of Judge Worden, when we say that he lost the greatest opportunity that probably he will ever have, to show that he was big and broad enough to deserve the confidence and support of the people of the county.

When the opinion of the supreme court was received, how much bigger and broader Judge Worden would have loomed up had he gone to the people and said: "I know that you only intended to elect me to office for four years; I believed that I was only elected for that period, but the supreme court says that I can legally hold the office for two more years. I want the office, but I do not want anything in the gift of the people unless it is their wish that I should have it. My personal desires shall be subservient to the will of the people; therefore, this election will continue as if the supreme court had not spoken, and if by your votes you show that my work has met with your approval, I will try and faithfully serve you for the next two years. If, however, you should say that you do not wish me to remain in office, then I will resign and go back to private life with the feeling and consciousness that I had been honest with the people of my county."

How many votes do you think the above stand would have brought Judge Worden?

Of course that was too much to expect of a man like Judge Worden. He has shown that he has some private reason for wanting to continue in this office. He intimates that he knows better what the people should have than they do themselves, and therefore, because a joker in the law permits him to hold the office for two more years, he is going to hang onto the job, no matter what the people say about it.

THAT RURAL CREDITS BILL

WHAT has become of the system of rural credits which the democrats promised farmers of the country would be enacted into law just as soon as the new federal reserve law was disposed of by congress?

When efforts were made to amend the currency bill in both the house and the senate, all such amendments were voted down, and the advocates of this legislation in behalf of the farmers were told that an effective and workable rural credits law would follow promptly.

It has not been forgotten that President Wilson once issued a personal statement assuring the farmers of the

country that an open right-of-way would be given rural credit legislation immediately after the passage of the currency law. The currency bill became a law before Christmas, a year ago. Since then there has been a disposition on the part of the president and democratic leaders in congress not to mention rural credits. The farmers are told now, when they inquire about the promised farm loan system, that the problem has proved difficult and complicated.

It seems strange that an administration and congress, which were able to completely overturn the entire revenue and financial systems of the country, should now confess its incapacity to enact a rural credits system. This confession would not be so much of a reflection on democratic leadership, if the subject of rural credits were new to bankers, financiers or economists.

If the banking and currency committee leaders of the two houses are so much at sea there are a thousand intelligent heads of farmers' organizations throughout the United States who can frame a bill which would undoubtedly give all the results to be desired. And then our democratic friends might be surprised to learn that several countries in Europe have rural credits systems which have been in operation for years, to the satisfaction of the farmers.

The one big truth of the rural credits blockade in Congress is that the administration and its leaders in congress have been too busy playing politics and in trying to pass a war tax bill to make up the deficit in revenues produced by the Underwood tariff bill to pay any attention to the needs of the farmers.

The farmer, if the exemption passes, may expect an increase of from 30 to 50 per cent in taxation as soon as the law becomes operative.—Eugene Guard.

Water Users Are Urged to at Once Sign the Acceptance Form

Comptroller of the Reclamation Service Calls Attention to Benefits to Come From Early Action in Matter

To the Water Users of the Klamath Project:

This is to impress upon you the urgent necessity for the immediate acceptance of the terms of the reclamation extension act by signing the form provided for that purpose attached to the public notice issued September 24, 1914, copies of which may be obtained from the project manager.

Although, under the terms of the reclamation extension act water users have six months within which to record and file their acceptance, attention is called to the fact that unless such acceptances are made, recorded and filed before May 1, 1915, payments due to the reclamation service under the terms of the reclamation law, as they existed prior to the passage of the reclamation extension act, must be made on that date. That is to say, that there will accrue on May 1, 1915, an installment of \$1 per acre, which must be paid then unless your acceptance has been previously filed.

If such acceptance is filed before December 1, 1914, there will accrue on December 1, 1914, instead of the installment of \$3 per acre due May 1, 1915, an installment amounting to only 2 per cent of the balance due under the contract for the purchase of water rights. For example: the water user who has paid \$12 on account of the construction charge of \$30, and who therefore owes a balance of only \$18, will on December 1, 1914, be required to pay only 36 cents per acre, whereas, unless the acceptance is executed and filed before May 1, 1915, such person will be required to pay \$3 per acre.

If the water user is in arrears for any sum accrued prior to May 1,

1915, and he has not filed his acceptance of the terms of the reclamation act before that date, it will be necessary for him not only to pay the \$3 per acre installment due on May 1, but it will also be necessary for him to pay the balance of the accrued charges which he has failed or neglected heretofore to pay. This payment will be enforced under the provisions of the old law. Failure to pay these charges will work a forfeiture of the water right application or entry. Assuming that the amount due and payable prior to May 1, 1915, is \$4 per acre, the total amount which he will be required to pay if he does not sign the acceptance of the act will be \$7 per acre, whereas, if he signs the acceptance he will be required to pay on December 1, 1914, only 36 cents per acre.

The facts above given are in illustration of the advantage of immediately signing the acceptance of the reclamation extension act.

This formality should not be delayed one moment longer than is absolutely necessary, for if these acceptances are delayed until the last moment it will be impossible for the reclamation service to compute the balance due and render its bills under the terms of the reclamation extension act. Therefore, bills will be rendered against the water user for the

balance due under the application of the old law, unless such acceptances are executed, recorded and filed, as required by the terms of the public notice of September 24, 1914, not later than November 15, 1914.
