ANCIENT MURDER PUZZLES SCIENCE

**WHAT IS BELIEVED THE OLDEST
HOMICIDE ON THE PACIFIC
COAST IS UNEARTHED BY
PALEONTOLOGISTS**

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 30.—Scien-
tists are trying today to penetrate the
oldest murder mystery of the Pacific
Coast. The crime, according to the
investigators, was committed thou-
sands of years ago.

Naturally the names of the prin-
cipals are not known. The only evi-
dence is the skeleton of a woman,
which was found in the famous La
Brea asphaltum pits near Los An-
geles, where paleontologists have un-
earthed the bones of prehistoric
horses, sabre-toothed tigers and other
beasts.

Experts agree that the position of
the body indicated the woman had
been thrown headfirst into the pit.

A more complete hypothesis includ-
ed a blow on the head, possibly from
the club of a cave man. Learned men
from a dozen universities are inter-
esting themselves in the mystery.
