THROUGH THE CAPITALS OF THE NATIONS NOW FIGHTING
EACH OTHER—SOME ARE TRIVIAL, BUT ALL ARE INTEREST-
ING AT THIS TIME.**

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 31—Like "In-
fernal music mixed with fire and
smoke," is the way John Slatinski,
who just reached here from Russia,
describes the sound of gun fire that
he was forced to listen to for eighteen
hours while lying in a hollow place
in a field directly in the center of a
battlefield on which the Russians and
Germans were meeting.

Slatinski, who lived in America,
went to Russia at the outbreak of the
war in an effort to find his father and
get him out of the country. He
could not find him, and he was re-
turning toward the German lines
when he ran afoul of a battle. He
was in the midst of bursting shells
before he knew it. He found a sort
of a dug-out, which the Russians had
made to support a field piece, and
he laid down in it. He said he laid
there for eighteen hours while the
battle raged about him.

"The noise was terrific," he said,
"but all the shells passed over me,
and I was unharmed."

Slatinski, when the noise of the
guns ceased, crawled out of the hole
and made his way to the German
lines. He was arrested several times.

but managed to make his way
through.
