OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"To Pray"
By E. C. RICHARDS, Pastor Grace Methodist Episcopal Church

"And I say unto you, Ask and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you."—Luke, 11:9.
If there is purpose in anything, then there ought to be purpose in everything. If God planned a world, he planned its inhabitants. If he planned a man, he surely planned the surroundings for that man. If he gave ambitions worth while, there ought to be some way to realize them. Prayer is talking to God about these things.
Just before the text, Jesus had been teaching his disciples what we call the Lord's prayer. Then he told them about a friend who, just because of a man's importunity, arose from sleep and ministered unto him. Then he said the words of the text.

What is prayer? The lowest form of prayer known consists in asking God for things. A great many hardly get up this high in life. But many do. Jesus was teaching prayer to very simple men. He began low down and ended high up. A great many of us get up far enough to ask God for things. If sorrow comes we ask him to remove it. If life is unsatisfactory, we ask him to make it satisfactory. If we find ourselves failing in business, we ask God to make us successful. And all these are good prayers. But some people go farther. They go so far that they ask God to make them good; to take away their sin. They want to be God's spiritual children. They ask for self control. They ask for joy within. They pray for peace. They seek power to lead men to good. This is higher ground. We are getting up. Sometimes we get so far up that we feel we are in some sense in partnership with God, something like a son may be a junior partner with his father. We remember that in this prayer Jesus said at the beginning, "Our Father." Being in partnership, we have a share in the business. So we are interested in a new way. We begin to seek counsel and to talk with God about the things we find to do as though those things were our own business, and we were responsible for them and their outcome. A new burden begins to bear down on us. It is like the burden that bears down on the shoulders of a boy whose father first lets him do a bit of work. The boy is proud. It becomes his work. Prayer rises high now. The earth, its streams, its clouds, its fields, its men, its stores, its shops, its homes, belong to us and God. We are so interested we just must talk to Him about these things. We forget to be sick. We even forget to be bad. Goodness seems to have taken possession of us. We rise

City of Klamath Falls Improvement Bonds.

Sealed proposals will be received by the undersigned until Thursday, November 12, 1914, at the hour of 1 o'clock p. m. of said day, at the city hall in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, (and at such time and place all proposals received will be opened) for the purchase of \$25,021.15 City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, coupon improvement bonds, payable ten years from date of issue, bearing a rate of interest not to exceed six per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable at the office of the city treasurer or at the fiscal agency of the state of Oregon, in New York, principal and interest payable in gold coin of the United States of America.
