ANOTHER INDICTMENT

ANDREW J. HORNER, who resides at Tenth and Bush streets, is the season's first typhoid victim. And why is he ailed? Because the Ankeny canal runs through his yard.

This waterway, from source to mouth, is a mass of weeds and moss, a final resting place for dead animals, tin cans and trash. Its slimy puddles are inhabited by frogs, and as an ideal mosquito and disease breeding place, the ditch has few equals and no superiors.

Horner is the first typhoid victim this year. Will he be the last? From experience in autumn past, we are afraid not.

The city or citizens for years past have been at work to have this canal closed. Some of the owners of water rights under it have held them at excessive prices. But nothing has been done by these water right owners to make the ditch less a menace to health.

The question of empowering the council to take the control of the Ankeny canal over from the government, and whatever steps may be needed to vacate it will soon be up to the voters. Do your share at that time, and eliminate this typhoid germ factory forever, before its toll of death and disease mounts higher.

Death Penalty Ended
by Votes of the People

The following from the Portland Journal:

Complete election returns from every county except Malheur indicate that the measure to abolish capital punishment in this state has carried.

Earlier returns indicated that the bill had failed of enactment by a few hundred votes, and it was generally given up by its supporters as lost. So the change in the totals came as a surprise, though a pleasant one, to them. Complete returns from all the counties except Malheur give the following vote on the measure:

For abolishment of the death penalty, 28,974; against, 28,876. Majority for abolishment, 98.

Incomplete returns from Malheur county indicate that that county will give a favorable majority to the measure, increasing the majority by which the measure was carried in the state. Fourteen counties voted in favor of

doing away with the death penalty, and twenty against it. The comparatively large majorities in favor of the measure in Multnomah and Jackson counties overcame the narrower margins against it in the other counties.

In Multnomah county the bill received a majority of 2,412, and in Jackson county a majority of 1,037. The largest majority against the bill was cast in Washington county. The unfavorable majority was 1,115.

The counties that voted to abolish the death penalty were Baker, Coos, Crook, Curry, Harney, Hood River, Jackson, Lane, Lincoln, Multnomah, Tillamook, Umatilla, Wallowa and apparently Malheur.

Those voting to retain the death penalty were Benton, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Douglas, Gilliam, Grant, Josephine, Klamath, Lake, Linn, Marion, Morrow, Polk, Sherman, Union, Wasco, Washington, Wheeler and Yamhill.

A LITTLE SPORTING GOSSIP

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Here's a real war item. Victor Linart, a Belgian entered in the six-day bicycle race here, got in training for the event by running from the Germans. Linart admits that he won the now famous dash from Antwerp when the Germans captured the city, and was the first to reach the famous coast resort.

Linart is the middle distance champion of Belgium. After reaching Ostend ahead of all the other starters, Linart went to Folkestone, England, where he was a refugee. A German shell wrecked his home during the bombardment of Antwerp, and he lost his racing outfit. This did not interfere with his speed in reaching Ostend, however, and Floyd McFarland, managing the six-day race, had new tops waiting for him here. In a letter to McFarland while at Folkestone, Linart said:

"I rode my wheel from Antwerp to Ostend, and it was a hard ride. I was one of the last to leave Antwerp and the first to arrive at Ostend. Making wide detours to escape the awful congestion on the main highway tripled the distance, and riding at top speed all the time put me in fine shape."

Many Germans are fleeing to death in the trenches in the eastern battle area. The trenches were dug in marshes, and the ice formed in them. Austrians claim to be doing better fighting than the Germans since they weeded out the Slavs.

To prevent famine, Austria and Hungary have directed that after December 1st all bread shall contain not more than 70 per cent of wheat flour or rye meal, the remainder may consist of barley, maize or potato meal.

Oregon Delegation to
Work for Reclamation

(From the Oregon Journal)

The Oregon delegation on its return to Washington will take up with the department of the interior the matter of the \$450,000 allotment that has already been made for co-operative reclamation work in the state. This action was decided upon at a conference held in Senator Chamberlain's office Friday afternoon. In addition to Senator Chamberlain there were present at the conference Senator Lane, Representative N. J. Sinnott of the Second District, Governor West, Joseph N. Teal and a delegation from Crook county, composed of Messrs. King, Bates, Johnson and Howard.

Speaking of the conference, Representative Sinnott said:

"We discussed the securing of the \$450,000 allotment which Secretary of the Interior Lane made last year for co-operative work between the government and the state. Secretary Lane takes the position that the expenditure was contingent on the state setting aside a similar sum, and also on the state's officials designating the project on which the money is to be expended."

"Governor West and Mr. Teal take the position that Secretary Lane promised the money on account of the

state having already appropriated to the legislature or 1913 money for this co-operative work, which money has already been spent by the state in the Tumalo project.

"We will present the facts gathered to Secretary Lane, and insist that there is nothing further to be done by the state except to designate the project where the government's \$450,000 appropriation should be spent."

Representative Sinnott expects to return to Washington in a few days, but may not leave before the latter part of the month.

As the representative of one of the largest congressional districts from the standpoint of area and one that is being rapidly settled up, a great deal of his congressional duties appertain to land matters, postal routes and rural delivery.

"I expect to give considerable study to the question of a rural credit system," said he, "which will be one of the next important pieces of legislation to be considered."

As to the work of the Oregon delegation, he said:

"It has worked harmoniously in the past for the best interests of the state, and it will continue to do so."
