HELP A STARVING NATION

THE CRY of Belgium for food will appeal to every human heart in America. Four months ago it was inhabited by 7,000,000 peaceable, happy people. Its air was filled with the songs of happy husbandmen, the hum of factories, the ringing of joy bells, and the land was dotted by fair cities adorned by wonderful, beautiful structures and the works of art which its galleries contained were a world's delight. And its continued safety and peace were assured by the solemn covenants of all the strong nations surrounding it.

Now its harvests have been destroyed, its soil churned into a desert by the tread of vast armies, the hoofbeats of horses and the grind of artillery wheels; its cities have been made blackened ruins by the instruments of extermination which war employs; it has been swept by fire and sword, and from affluence and comfort its brave people are starving.

Their king from a defensive battlefield is crying to us to save his people from starvation. We are sure the response will be both prompt and generous, generous as a sympathizing great people can make it. Think of it, brave men, beautiful women and little children by millions on the verge of starvation and only six days distant from our shores!

We are certain what the response from the people will be, and if in the absence of congress the president assumes the responsibility and orders such help as the occasion requires, congress will, on reconvening, ratify his act and the people will applaud. The Rockefeller gifts are splendid, but they are not enough, the need is over-mastering, the appeal is to the whole American people.

The appeal has spread all over the United States, and Klamath Falls and Klamath county are asked to do their share. Dried fruits, bacon, beans, etc., are sorely needed, and any contributions of this kind made by Klamath county citizens will be gladly taken care of here by the Klamath Chamber of Commerce, and forwarded to the nearest collection depot for shipment as soon as possible.

Wilson to Go Through Canal on the Oregon

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 18.—President Wilson's itinerary and plans for the formal opening of the Panama canal and the Panama-Pacific exposition were given in detail recently by Lieutenant Commander Needham L. Jones, naval aid to the president, who is in this city. Twenty-seven foreign battleships and seventeen United States vessels will participate. In outlining the plans Lieutenant Jones said:

"The foreign ships will arrive at Hampton Roads between February 10 and 15, and will there join the United States fleet. The foreign officers will be brought to Washington by the United States officers, and on February 20 will be taken to the White House to meet the president. They will be present when he will press the button that opens the exposition."

"On February 22 the president will go to Hampton Roads to review the ships as they sail for the Eastern terminal. On March 5 the president will return to Hampton Roads to join the United States steamship New York and sail for Colon. The New York will be conveyed by her sister ship, the Texas."

"The two vessels will arrive at Colon March 10, and the president will shift to the Oregon to go through the canal. On the Oregon will be the president, the secretary of the navy, Admiral Clark, who commanded the Oregon on her trip around the Horn, and Admiral Dewey."

"Upon the arrival of the Oregon at Balboa, the formal celebration of the opening of the canal will be held with illuminations at night. The president

will exchange visits with the president of the Republic of Panama, after which he will go aboard the New York and proceed to San Francisco at the head of the fleet.

The president will stop at San Diego for three days, and will arrive in San Francisco March 24. After four days at the Panama-Pacific exposition, he will proceed to Washington by private car, while the secretary of the navy will go to Puget Sound to inspect the navy yard at that place.

"The only persons accompanying the president on the New York will be the secretary of the navy and the president's naval aid."

Lieutenant Commander Jones did not announce the names of the foreign or the United States warships which will participate in the formalities.

American Red Cross Knows No Nationality in Its Work

Aside From Wishing the War Could Be Declared a Draw, "Angels of Mercy" Are Concerned Wholly With Relieving Wounded of All Armies

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—When it comes to real neutrality, Miss Mabel Boardman, active chief of the American Red Cross, has it with a sincerity that no one could doubt. She doesn't want any nation of Europe to win. She wants the big war to be a draw.

And this is how she explained her position. Her work naturally allows of no favoritism, of no partiality. It demands the distribution of mercy—of supplies; of medical attention, and of kind words to Russian, German, French and English alike. Humanity knows no nationality, as she explained it to me. Now, if one side wins, it will mean that there will be large indemnities for the other side to pay. The bitterness engendered by this, the greatest war the world has ever known, will remain. The conquered will still bear malice. He will feel the sting of defeat, the burden of war, the blasting effects of his young men and his industries for years to come. But on the other hand, Miss Boardman argued, if the big war is a draw, there will be less of the lingering animosity.

All nations will have had their bitter lesson; all will have had their revenge—if that is what they desire; all will be on equal footing. Their big armaments will be shattered, and perhaps this will be the basis for a world peace without armaments.

And Miss Boardman, perhaps more clearly than anyone with whom I have discussed the problem, has the viewpoint of all nations. She knows how Germany felt about Russia; how France and Belgium felt about Germany; how England and Russia regarded the conflict. With all she has sympathy. She places no blame; she draws no comparison; yet in her position of ministering angel to all nations, she seems to have absorbed their spirit, their viewpoint, and she seems to know just how it must feel to be a citizen of any one of the warring nations—minus the bitterness of their prejudice.

To wipe out the spirit of international prejudice is one of the aims of Miss Boardman's Red Cross work.

Her nurses and doctors, without taking sides, are trying to instill in their patients the spirit of humanity; are trying to subdue the element of brutality that to a greater or less extent crops out in any army in war time. Her spirit is that the Red Cross shall leave a pleasant taste in the mouths of all nations. They must return to their homes with the word, "We were well used in the foreign land; the Red Cross nurses of that nation were our friends when we needed friends." Is that spirit, any nation must have a better feeling toward its neighbor when the war is at an end.

That is the gigantic task to which this woman has set her heart and her hand, in addition to the big labor of trying to keep peace with the work of giving medical aid, food and supplies to the wounded and destitute of Europe's battlefields.

And in this spirit, she has the big, broad vision of actual neutrality—malice toward no nation, prejudice toward none, naught but aid, friendship, the helping hand.
