

# A Chronology of the War

## Cut This Out and Save It, If You Want Dates Straight

- June 28—Assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand and his wife at Sarajevo, by Serbs.
- July 23—Austria sends ultimatum to Servia, demanding reparation for the assassination.
- July 25—Servia replies granting all Austria's claims except right of Austrian officials to participate in Servia's inquiry commission.
- July 29—Austria bombards Belgrade.
- July 30—Russian army begins mobilizing.
- August 1—Germany declares war on Russia. German invasion of Luxembourg begins.
- August 2—Germany sends ultimatum to Belgium demanding free passage through Belgian territory and invades France at Cleve.
- August 3—Belgium rejects German demands and declares she will protect her neutrality by force.
- August 4—Great Britain declares a state of war exists with Germany. Germany declares war on France.
- August 5—German attacks on Liege repulsed with heavy loss.
- August 6—British cruiser Amphion sunk in North Sea by mine; first armored ship to be destroyed.
- August 7—Montenegro declares war on Austria.
- August 8, 9—French advance into Alsace, capturing Altkirch and Mulhausen.
- August 10—Germans occupy Liege. France declares war on Austria.
- August 12—Great Britain declares war on Austria.
- August 14—France begins invasion of Lorraine.
- August 16—British expeditionary force completes its landing in France.
- August 17—Belgian seat of government transferred to Antwerp.
- August 20—Germans occupy Brussels.
- August 21—Battle of Sambre for possession of southeastern Belgium begins.
- August 23—Japan declares war on Germany.
- August 24—Germans capture Namur. Allies are forced out of Belgium. French armies in Alsace and Lorraine abandon the offensive and hasten to reinforce northern armies retreating toward Paris.
- August 25—Germans destroy Louvain. British develop their rearward action, which saves French left wing.
- August 26—German crown prince's army captures fortress of Longwy.
- British fleet sinks two German cruisers and two German torpedo boats in battle off Heligoland.
- August 31—Germans overwhelm Russian armies in East Prussian marshes, latter's casualties aggregating 70,000.
- September 2—Russians capture Lemberg, Galicia.
- September 3—Seat of French government removed to Bordeaux.
- September 5—Germans capture Rheims.
- England, France and Russia sign agreement not to conclude peace separately.
- September 6—Allies retreat south of the Marne and the battle of the Marne begins.
- September 7—General von Kluk's army passes in front of Paris and reaches extreme point of German invasion, at Provins.
- Germans capture fortified camp of Mauberge and take 40,000 prisoners.
- September 8—Allies begin to force Germans back before Paris.
- September 9—General von Kluk's army retreats 25 miles.
- September 11—German center, based on Vitry-le-Francois, begins retreat. Battle of the Marne ends in allied victory.
- September 12—Germans strongly entrench themselves along the Aisne River and battle of Aisne begins.
- September 14—Shattered Austrian armies make a stand along the strongly fortified San River.
- September 15—Allies recapture Rheims.
- September 20—Germans bombard Rheims Cathedral.
- September 22—German submarine U-9 sinks the British cruisers Aboukir, Cressy and Hogue. Russians capture Jaroslavl.
- September 23—Allied left wing in battle of the Aisne begins its march northward in effort to envelop General von Kluk's army.
- September 24—Germans try to break French eastern frontier defenses.
- September 26—Germans begin siege of Antwerp.
- September 30—Russians prevent Germans crossing Niemen River and force them to retire toward East Prussia.
- October 2—Northern movement of allies reaches Arras and Germans begin to turn it westward.
- October 3—Germans are defeated by Russians in battle of Augustowo.
- October 9—Antwerp capitulates and Anglo-Belgian army retreats toward Ostend.
- October 10—Germans advance upon Warsaw and Russian army near Cracow retreats toward River San.
- October 12—Rebellion breaks out among South African Boers.
- October 15—Russians begin concentrating to save Warsaw.
- Germans occupy Ostend.
- October 16—German submarine U-9 sinks British cruiser Hawke.
- October 17—Germans advance from Ostend with intention of capturing Dunkirk.
- October 18—French army which was driven westward from Arras forces Germans back 30 miles and recovers its perpendicular formation northward from Arras. Battle of Ostend merges into battle of the Yser. Anti-German mobs get beyond police control in London and destroy German shops and houses.
- October 19—British fleet assists land operations in Western Belgium by bombarding German right wing.
- October 21—Russians take offensive before Warsaw, and German invading army begins to retreat.
- October 24—Germans cross Yser River in Western Belgium, making important gains.
- October 25—Germans begin new offensive against Augustowo, to create diversion for relief of Germans retreating before Warsaw.
- October 27—Italy lands force at Avlona to protect interests in Albania.
- October 29—German cruiser Emden enters harbor of Penang, disguised, and after torpedoing Russian cruiser and French destroyer, escapes undamaged. Turkish warships bombard Russian Black Sea ports.
- October 31—Belgians flood Yser district.
- November 2—Great Britain closes North Sea to commerce, for mine laying purposes.
- November 3—Admiral von Spee reports his German squadron of five warships on November 1, off Chilean coast, sank British cruiser Monmouth, set cruiser Good Hope afire, and damaged cruiser Glasgow and converted cruiser Otranto. Germans are driven back across Yser in Western Belgium. Russia begins offensive against Turks along Armenian border.
- November 4—Turkey breaks off diplomatic relations with Great Britain, France, Russia and Servia. Anglo-French fleet bombards Dardanelles.
- November 5—Great Britain and France declares war on Turkey.
- November 6—Turkey declares a holy war against allies, and calls on all

## German Princess in Washington



Princess von Hatzfeldt-Trachenberg, wife of the new ambassador of the German embassy, has arrived in Washington for the winter. She and her husband have taken an apartment, after living at a hotel for some time, and it is expected they will entertain, if the course of the war in Europe does not make that impossible.

- Moslems to fight. Tsing Tau surrenders to Japs and British Indians.
- November 7—Russian armies, under General Rennenkampf invade East Prussia. Kaiser reported on battle line near Ypres.
- November 8—Germans resume offensive around Dix Mude after short lull, evidently for the placing of reinforcements. Anglo-French warships bombard Dardanelles. Russians inside Posen boundary.
- November 10—German cruiser Emden driven ashore on Cocos Island in the Indian Ocean and burned to water's edge by Australian cruiser Sydney. Heavy losses reported in Flanders fighting. German cruiser Konigsberg is bottled in African river by British cruiser Chatham.
- November 11—Loss of Emden cuts the insurance risk on shipping 50 per cent. Germans take Dix Mude. German crown prince leaves Woerw district to take command of troops opposing Russian advance. Russians 20 miles from Cracow.
- November 12—British gunboat Niger submerged one mile off British coast, in view of hundreds on shore. Russian troops advance in Turkey campaign.
- November 13—Allies retake Dix Mude. Violence of fighting in the north abates.
- November 14—Word received of sinking of British super-dreadnaught Audacious off Irish coast from mine or submarine. Lord Roberts, British field marshal and Boer war hero, 82, dies while on visit to the British lines. Rains, gales and sleet storms sweeping Flanders causing much discomfort and privation. British troops repulse Prussian guard after ferocious hand to hand fight.
- November 15—Premier Asquith asks Lillion and a quarter war credit. Belgians and French again cut dykes and flood stretch from Dix Mude to Bixchoote, drowning German regiment.
- November 16—Floods in north confine fighting to artillery. Germans renew attacks along the Aisne and at Rheims. Russians carry Goldap, supposedly impregnable hill, by storm. Austrians defeat Servians and are shelling Belgrade.
- November 17—Turkish fort at Smyrna fires at launch from U. S. S. Tennessee entering harbor to investigate conditions for United States. Raising of fog sees renewal of action by troops and gunboats in north of Belgium.
- November 18—Germans take the offensive in East Prussia, and drive Russians back to between Vistula and Warthe rivers. British people rush to subscribe war loan.
