Uncle Sam Now Makes His Christmas Gifts

DENVER, Nov. 19.—Uncle Sam is busy in Denver turning out the largest order of Christmas presents manufactured in the nation. No factory in the United States will manufacture Christmas produce of greater value than will the government in Denver this fall.

The particular gift to which he is turning his energies is money. Always before Christmas there is a demand in all parts of the nation for gold coins for presents, and the Denver mint has been selected to supply the entire output for the Middle West, East and South.

One million dollars worth of two-and-one-half-dollar gold pieces are now being coined at the mint. These

are distinctly Christmas coins. Always before the holidays there is a heavy demand for them. And after Christmas they drift back to the banks and subtreasuries, and only a few of them remain in circulation.

The order is the second in that denomination which the Denver mint has filled, and the local mint will be the only one this year to coin gold in this denomination. The coins are the most difficult to handle of all those turned out by the government. They are smaller than pennies, yet their value is so high that great pains must be taken with them.

After the 400,000 pieces in the order have been coined they will be sold to banks and individuals and shipped to subtreasuries to supply the Christmas demand.

SAYS NEGLECT IS SPOILING RANCH

J. P. SATTERLEE DEMANDS \$500 DAMAGES FROM KLAMATH COUNTY FARMER FOR ALLEGED FAILURE TO RUN FARM

Holding that as a result of the failure of Hiram Roberts to properly cultivate his farm on the Merrill road, south of here, the property is damaged, J. P. Satterlee, the owner of the tract, today filed a suit for \$500 damages. W. H. Shaw is his attorney.

The complaint alleges that the two entered into an agreement last fall whereby Roberts was to cultivate the Satterlee farm this year, giving Satterlee one-third of the profits. Satterlee says that the farm would have yielded \$1,200, so he demands \$400 general damages and \$100 damages because he says Roberts did not cultivate, and let the tract become overrun with weeds and infested with weed seeds, etc.

TROOPS MOVING THROUGH MEXICO

TWO THOUSAND CARRANZITES DESERT TO OTHER ARMY. CARRANZA ALSO HAS A PORTABLE CAPITAL NOW

VERA CRUZ, Nov. 19.—President Carranza's provisional government has moved to Orizaba, and for the

first time since the days of Maximilian, Mexico City has ceased to be headquarters of federal power.

General Benavides of the Villa army last night occupied Guajuata, capital of the same state. There was no fighting, the Carranzists retreating eastward from the city.

Villa has designated Irapuato as a concentration point, where he will mobilize for a dash to Mexico City.

General Villa himself has occupied Irapuato. It is reported that another Carranza division, this consisting of 2,000 men, has revolted and gone to Villa.

BANQUET TO BE GIVEN TUESDAY

MASTER FISH WARDEN CLANTON HERE FROM SALEM—WILL LOOK AT "LOST RIVER TROUT" TODAY

Following the arrival of Master Fish Warden R. E. Clanton from Salem Wednesday night, the Klamath Sportsmen's Association has definitely decided to hold its annual banquet at the White Pelican Hotel Tuesday night. At that time, officers will be elected for the ensuing year, and other matters of interest attended to.

This is to be a big duck dinner. Two hundred ducks are to be brought in by the sportsmen for use at the spread, and besides the viands, there will be a program of "jinks" for the delectation of the people present.

Warden Clanton is to be a guest of honor at the banquet. This afternoon he is going to the Lost River diversion dam to take some of the "Lost River trout," in an effort to establish their origin. Tomorrow he leaves for Lakeview on a business trip, and will return in time for the big banquet on Tuesday.

MUSN'T SHOOT WITHIN LIMITS

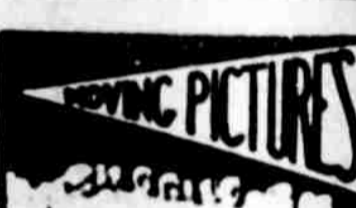
FAILING TO GET OUTSIDE OF THE CORPORATE LIMITS WHEN HE WANTED DUCKS CAUSES HUNTER TO PAY A FINE

Because he was shooting ducks along Link River within the city limits, J. H. Rea was arrested Wednesday by Deputy District Game Warden Henry Stout and fined \$5 by Police Judge Leavitt. As this was the first offense, Rea was brought before the city official. Had he been brought before a justice of the peace the minimum fine would have been \$25.

"There has been considerable shooting in the city limits by hunters, many of them perhaps thinking they were outside the city," said Stout today, "and we intend to stop this practice before someone is killed or wounded."

The fish and game laws of the state in this respect provide as follows:

"It shall hereafter be unlawful at any time within the state of Oregon for any person to hunt or trap any wild animal or wild bird within the corporate limits of any city, town or public park or cemetery, or on any campus or grounds of any public school, college or university, or within the boundaries of any watershed reservation as set aside by the United States government to supply water for domestic use to any city, town or community, or any lands within the boundaries of any national bird or game reservation or national park; provided, the provisions of this act shall not apply to any fur bearing animal or predatory animal or bird doing damage to public or private property, or any bird or animal which is taken for scientific purposes where such bird or animal is hunted or trapped under such rules and regulations as may be provided by law or by the proper officer or person of such city, town, park, cemetery, school, college, university, national park or reservation having such matters in charge."
