A CLEAN-UP WOULD HELP

IN HIS letter to The Herald Thursday, City Health Officer L. L. Truax, while not relieving the Aukney ditch of possible blame for the condition of Andrew J. Horner, a typhoid fever sufferer, brought out forcibly the fact that all sickness at this time cannot be ascribed to the disease-breeding waterway the city is so anxious to have abandoned and filled. Among other things, he cites the open toilets on the property of a number of people.

Now these people, while they have connected up with the sewers, have, for some unknown reason—possibly laziness—been endeavoring to undo to the utmost all of the benefits to be expected from a sewer system. The sewer's part in the health of the community is the carrying away of sewage, which, if left in the thickly populated parts of town, would attract thousands of flies, affect water, and cause one of the worst epidemics imaginable. But by leaving the old toilets on their premises, these people are aiding in the most favorable manner the continuation of the menace the sewer was designed to wipe out.

Why these open toilets are still standing in the yards of a number of prominent people is a matter that we cannot figure out. They have outlived their usefulness several years, and certainly cannot be considered an ornament to a place, or any improvement. Far from enhancing the value of property, they lower it considerably in the eyes of the public.

One thing that must be done, if Klamath Falls is to become perfectly healthy and sanitary, is the tearing down of these ancient structures. So long as they stand, they are peopled by flies, and sources from which disease can be scattered over the community.

There is, perhaps, no other town in Oregon that takes as much real healthy interest in its annual Clean-Up Day as does Klamath Falls. Ever since a few years ago by the Women's Civic League, the people of Klamath Falls, every spring, have made their premises spotless, and every bit of trash and rubbish, every old can, box and bottle was removed. But were the premises kept clean after that? Too often the answer must be in the negative. Instead of keeping up the splendid condition brought about by the clean-up, we have been prone to let cans, filth and rubbish again accumulate in our yards, contenting ourselves with the thought that there will be another Clean-Up Day next year.

Let's get selfish. Let's realize that a littered yard, besides being unsightly, is a constant danger to the health of ourselves and families. Let's clean up. A little work with a rake once a week or so will accomplish wonders. Very few applications to burn trash are ever denied by Chief of Police Smith, and by having a large

covered barrel or box, tin cans and that form of trash can be kept from scattering. When the box or barrel is full, it can be hauled to the city dump pile, emptied and returned at a trifling cost. For the sake of our health as well as appearances, let us feel that the blood of some possible victim of typhoid fever is upon our heads, let us each adopt the slogan: "Every day is Clean-Up Day at our place."
