

OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"Thanksgiving"

Ps. 92:1—"It is a good thing to give thanks unto Jehovah."

To our bountiful Father above, We will offer our tribute of praise, For the glorious gift of His love, And the blessings that hallow our days.

The custom of giving thanks to God publicly for the rich blessings of the year is as old as sacred history.

Three thousand years ago the Jews observed the feast of the tabernacles. This was their national harvest festival, and the sight of booths, and of marching millions to the Holy City with much singing, was common in the Savior's day.

The same spirit invades all Christian lands. Three hundred years ago, history records, there came a winter of unusual severity upon the Massachusetts Colony. Disease had weakened them, and gaunt-eyed famine followed close upon its track. The poor were compelled to live upon roots and shell fish—even the governor lived for a while on parched corn. A day of fasting and prayer was proclaimed, and five days later a ship loaded with provisions unexpectedly arrived from England, and the fasting season was turned to thanksgiving. Out of that time of faith and prayer, with barely enough to live upon, was born our Thanksgiving Day.

Amid our showers of blessings in gratitude is one of the blackest sins. Cardinal Gibbons said: "Gratitude to God is a most acceptable form of prayer—it has been called the respiration of the soul—breathing in and giving out." Let us note a few blessings that hallow our days.

First, the temporal blessings of providential ministry. God has given us life. How blessed to cross the boundary that separates nothingness to existence—to spring from darkness to light! Any form of life is precious, but man is earth's highest form of God's creation, and this very fact perplexed the Psalmist, for he asks, "What is man that thou art mindful of him?" Some of Eden's beauty is still here. The skies are fruitful, the sower reaps his harvest, and as he cares for the grass, so the

Great Over shepherd cares for his millions of people.

Second, the national blessing of Divine guidance. The hand of God is and has ever been in human history. The nations have come up before God to judgment, and those worthy have been perpetuated, while those unworthy have been left to perish. Our nation was founded by those who feared God and those chosen as its leaders have ever given Him honor. God has stood with us upon our battlefields fighting with us against the wrong. Our ship of state is safe in every storm, as long as God's hand is upon the helm. Should we not be grateful that we are citizens of this great nation?

Third, blessings of comradeship with God's people. No more select circle can be found than that of the Church of Christ. Not long since, none but the priests professed to be near God, but today all are realizing that we are priests before God. Almost every great leader in world affairs today is a Christian. 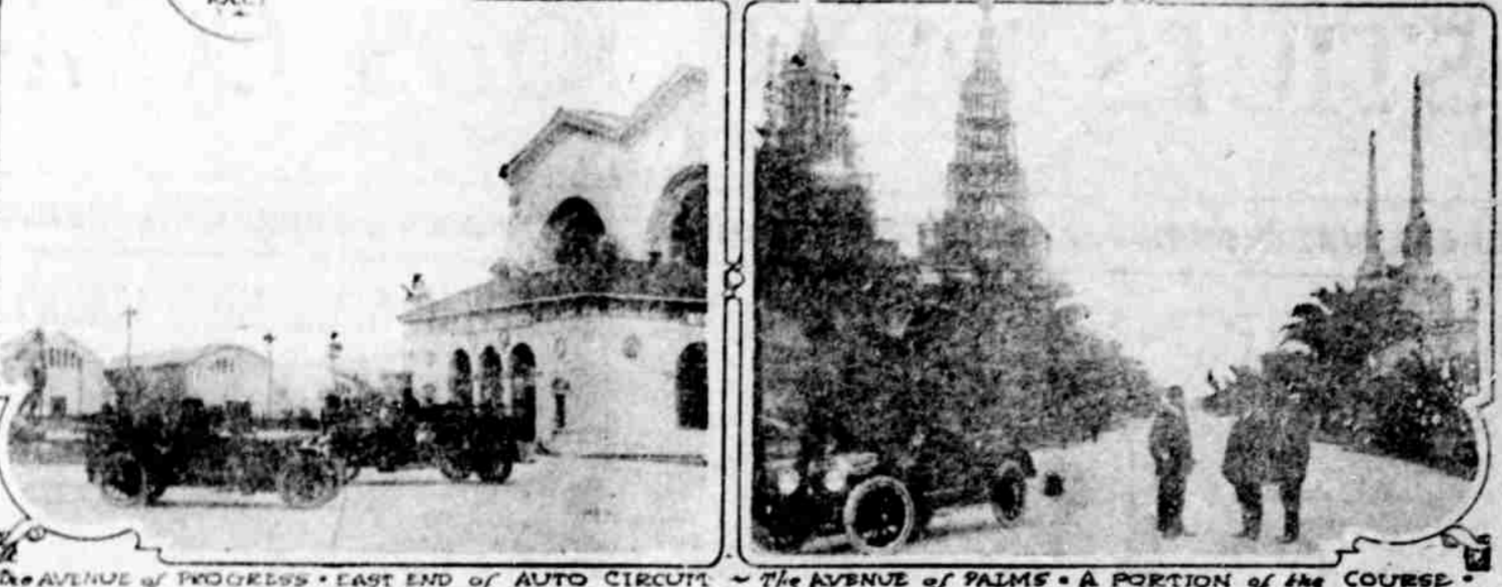

Thousands Can See the Vanderbilt Cup Race

(Herald Special Service) SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21.—If the people of the world retain the love of thrills they have evidenced through the 1314 years of the Christian calendar and during the several thousand years of the older calendars, there will be two days of the Panama-Pacific exposition that will stand mountains high above the 288 days, crowded with world appealing special events. These two days are February 22 and March 6. The first is the date of the Vanderbilt Cup race and the second is the day of the Grand Prix automobile race. But the mere fact that these races will take place on these days is not the source of all the pleasurable anticipation.

Barney Oldfield, the first entry in each race, and whose check is now on deposit, looked over the course a few days ago, and pronounced it the finest ever given over to the two races. The width ranges from thirty feet to eighty feet, and every foot of it, except the graded dirt track, is asphalt. The prizes for the Vanderbilt Cup event are: \$3,000 for first; \$2,000 for second; \$1,500 for third, and \$1,000 for fourth. The Grand Prix prizes are: The gold challenge cup donated by the Automobile Club of America and \$8,000 in cash, divided as follows: \$3,000 for first; \$2,000 for second; \$1,500 for third; \$1,000 for fourth and \$500 for fifth.
