PUBLIC PARKS AND BUILDINGS

ONE of the gratifying results of the general civic awakening throughout the country in recent years is the importance now given to public parks, playgrounds and open spaces, where the people may not only breathe pure air, but enjoy the beauties of nature and air combined. Many cities now point to their parks and boulevard systems as their chief attractions.

Formerly the notion prevailed that only the big cities needed parks and playgrounds, but today the town is considered behind the times if it is not making some effort to create parks and "beauty spots" within its boundaries. While abundant fresh air is one of the blessings of the country and small country town, places for public gatherings and recreation are needed in the country as well as in the city.

The American people are coming to realize that some recreation and play are requisites for health and happiness in both country and city. In the past country life has been too much of a life of hard work and drudgery, with little or no rest or recreation between. This, no doubt, has been one of the reasons why country boys and girls left the farm and sought the big city, where there was at least some diversion from the daily grind of earning the bread and butter necessary to sustain life.

To check the drift of population from the country and country towns to the large cities, life in the country must be made more desirable and attractive than it has been in years past. To this end plans for the improvement of the sanitary conditions and the beautification of environments must be worked out.

There must be aroused a more widespread interest in the general upbuilding of the country town and the surrounding rural districts, and in the establishment and maintenance of institutions that will not only check migration to the large cities, but attract city people to the country.

Make country life what it should be, the most desirable and comfortable, and people will begin to shun the tenements and slums of the overcrowded cities and seek homes in the country or suburban towns. Thus may the problem of congested population in our large cities be gradually solved, and serious threatened dangers to our republic surely evaded.

One of the means of adding to the attractiveness of country life is through the development of public parks and the erection of substantial, modern public buildings. Wherever some progress has been made along this line of beautification and public improvement, the people are not slow to appreciate the value of such work, both for themselves and as a means of attracting visitors and permanent homemakers.

In towns where matters of this kind have heretofore been neglected, it is sometimes "up-hill work" to begin. A few public-spirited men and women must be organized to awaken public sentiment along this line, and get the work started.

Once begun, the people soon commence to see its worth and appreciate the advantages thereof; they soon learn that parks are not only valuable civic assets, but that every open, free "breathing space" provided for the people helps to keep them in good health and more buoyant spirits. Beauty, so far as it refers to nature's outdoors, is more than skin deep, for it touches both the heart and mind, and its beneficent influence is beyond compute.

The development of parks and the improvement of public buildings foster general improvement of the town, and leads to the beautification of

COMMISSION AT WORK ON CREDITS

WELL KNOWN EDUCATORS, AGRICULTURISTS AND BANKERS ARE PREPARING RURAL CREDIT BILL FOR LEGISLATURE

(Herald Special Service)

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore., Nov. 23.—Oregon farmers may soon have the advantages of a rural credit law. In conformity with the action of the last session of the legislature, which made provision for the appointment of a commission to investigate rural credit and organization in the old world, Governor West has appointed a commission to draft a rural credit bill to be presented to the next legislature for its consideration.

The head of the commission is Dr. Hector Macpherson of the Agricultural College school of commerce, who was a member of the American commission that visited Europe last summer. Dr. Macpherson has already called the members of the new commission together to discuss the proposed measure, and try to arrange provisions that would be helpful to the farmer and satisfactory to the people of the state at large. The additional members of the commission are the following:

H. G. Starkweather of Milwaukee, who was also a member of the American commission to study European conditions; S. L. Garland of Lebanon, senator elect; Dana H. Allen of Salem, representative elect; Professor F. G. Young of the University of Oregon; Sidney B. Vincent, field staff member of the corporation department; and S. G. Sargent, state bank superintendent.

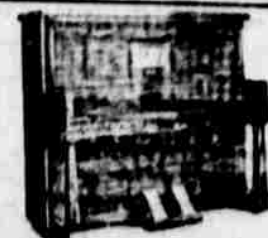

Our Weekly Health Talk

Keep Your Feet Warm—A Precaution That Will Avoid Many Inevitable Health Dangers.

The feet contain more capillaries than any other part of the body. Capillaries are blood vessels of the smallest size. They connect the arteries with the veins, and are present everywhere in the body. All of the blood, after leaving the arteries, must pass through the capillaries before getting back to the heart.

The capillaries are so constructed that when a part of the body becomes chilled, the capillaries in that part become much smaller, and the blood passes through them much more slowly. The feet contain so many capillaries, which lie close to the surface, that when the feet become chilled not only is a large amount of blood robbed of its heat, but the slowing of the blood stream interferes with the proper circulation of blood, which is necessary for health, and causes a congestion of the internal organs that favors disease. Thus cold feet, aside from being uncomfortable, are a menace to health.

Proper foot wear is the first essential to warm feet. Low shoes and silk stockings are all right for summer, but high shoes and heavy stockings are necessary for winter. Women who in winter wear but little more than low shoes and silk stockings upon the lower part of the body, and on the upper part a heavy fur coat, are heating the body unequally, and inviting disease. During cold weather everyone should wear moderately heavy socks and high shoes. If there is any difference, the feet need more protection than the upper part of the body.

Woolen socks or stockings tend to cause cold feet. Wool overheats the feet and retains the moisture while indoors. Then on going out into the cold, the stockings, being moist, become cold and clammy and chill the feet. The feet should be kept dry in wet weather. Nothing chills the feet so rapidly as damp footwear.

Those who habitually have cold feet should, in addition to clothing the feet properly, bathe daily in cool water and follow with a thorough rubbing with a dry towel. This should be followed with a few minutes of leg exercise—raising the body on the toes and heels.
