GERMAN THOROUGHNESS

REGARDLESS of one's sympathies occasioned by heredity or by prejudice, all must admit that Germany is, has been and will continue to be a great nation. The masses of the soldiers, whether they be German, French, English or Russian, are fighting simply because their country is at war, and not because they like to play their fellow men. If left to the men behind the guns there never would have been any war.

Put in war, as well as in peace, Germany has demonstrated her thoroughness. Her army is the most marvelous fighting machine the world has ever seen or even dreamed of.

However, it is not only as soldiers that the Germans stand out so pre-eminently, but in the peaceful pursuits. The great poets and musicians of Germany rank at the head. In the colleges and universities of Germany many of America's greatest scientists have obtained their knowledge and have been moulded into thoroughness.

In Germany there is no slovenliness in business of any kind. The German cities are the world's models and German manufacturers have captured many of the world's most desirable markets, and all because of the thoroughness of the business training of the men of commerce.

It is puerile for the peoples of the warring nations to think of boycotting German literature, or art, or manufactures after the war is ended.

The Germany of Goethe, of Schiller and of all the great scientists and artists, as well as of the poets, will shine in the future as in the past, no matter how the awful struggle may terminate.

A LITTLE SPORTING GOSSIP

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—Open season with no restrictions was formally declared today, by 47,893,945 bone fide members of the Stove League of the United States and contiguous portions of Canada. Baseball was smothered weeks ago by Emperor Football. The Emperor himself died his annual natural death on Saturday at the close of the Army-Navy battle. With these two major sports down and out until next year, there is more food for the Stove Leaguers to mull over during the 1914-1915 lull than there has been for some time.

As a charter member of the Winter Gablestors' League, we propose the following as the most desirable and absolutely unimportant subjects that could be mullied over by any two or more fans, seated at the stove-side.

Will the Feds go to the wall before August 1, 1915? Who will manage the Hopeless Yanks? Will the Braves be able to repeat? Will Ty Cobb be able to curb his hatred toward butchers? How much longer will Christy Mathewson last? And so on, etcetera, not to mention the

physical combats that might result from Boston and Philadelphia fans discussing the respective chances of the Red Sox and Athletics for next year.

If any of the football standpatters still tell you that the new game is not what's wanted, or that it hasn't come to stay, just let the following vibrate against their tympanic membranes.

More colleges adopted and played the open game in 1914 than in any other season in the history of the gridiron sport. During the same season there were fewer injuries than occurred in any other season. In no big or near big college clash have there occurred injuries which have proved fatal to a player. Injuries that have been sustained in the game between regularly organized, regularly coached college and school teams have been only of the minor variety.

As far as we can remember, not one fatality has been reported. Undoubtedly there have been serious injuries among the corner-lot knights of the pigskin, but these can be hardly be counted in the taking of testimony or the final summing up of the lawyers for the prosecution of Old Man Football.

The football season just closing, by the way, developed as grand a bit of manly sportsmanship as has ever been seen. To Fordham University goes the palm for its courageous generosity in voting to grant Vermont University a victory by a 7 to 6 score, because there was some discussion regarding the kicking of a goal. The umpire allowed the goal, but the referee voted differently, and the Fordham athletics voted Vermont the game "rather than have a visiting team suffer through indifference of opinion among officials."

Oscar H. Fernbach, who went to Mexico recently as United States commissioner to exploit the Panama-Pacific International Exposition has returned to San Francisco. On the route returning he stopped at Havana and found great enthusiasm there for the Exposition.

G. A. Dennison, chief of the department of horticulture of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, has received from a firm in St. Albans, England, a letter stating that shipments of shrubs and trees from Europe for the Exposition will proceed as planned before the war.
