

SOME MINOR WAR NEWS FROM EUROPE

LITTLE STORIES FROM THE FRONT THAT ARE COMING IN THROUGH THE CAPITALS OF THE NATIONS NOW FIGHTING EACH OTHER—SOME ARE TRIVIAL, BUT ALL ARE INTERESTING AT THIS TIME.

ON BOARD THE "SALVADOR," Oct. 27. (By Mail to New York)—This is literally a ship load of misery. We have on board 2,000 Belgian women and babies, with a sprinkling of old men and boys bound for La Pallice, where the French government is preparing to take care of them.

All about me, on the rusty deck of this huge iron tramp steamer, are the war's outcasts. Each is carrying a small bundle none bigger than might contain a large pocket handkerchief.

If we ever get to sea and a blow comes up we'll turn turtle as sure as fate and I don't think many on the ship would care. There isn't an ounce of freight aboard and no ballast; but up, up, up the steep and very lofty ladder, from dock to deck, a stream of poor refugees is pouring.

Back of me is a Belgian family; mother, two babies, grandmother and grandfather. They have walked to Calais from Antwerp. The two little babies are in a hamper filled with old clothes.

The old folks have taken turns at the two ends of the stick on which they had hung the basket holding the babies. They look dazed, hungry, very tired; no doubt they are all that

and more. The children have the same pinched look, and I have seen thousands of babies' faces in their fix, a look one simply cannot get used to seeing without feeling a tightening sensation around the heart.

One is a bare-headed woman, perhaps not more than 22. Heavily dressed and "gotten-up" some, one would say she was pretty. Now she sits staring out over the railing at the roof of the warehouse a hundred feet away.

Next to her is an old man, perhaps 65, with very scrubby, grayish whiskers. He, too, is staring at the warehouse roof. On his knees is a bundle, done up in a striped material. Perhaps it might have been a pillow slip or part of one at some former time.

He fuddled by the misery they have gone through, fatigued by their long tramp about, their resistance weakened by the remorseless crush of the war, starting, humble, chilled and hungry crowd the corroded deck of the tramp and stay wherever they are put.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—Without attempting an explanation of the why or wherefore, a comparison of the respective batting average of eight baseball players before they jumped Organized Baseball and after they joined the Federals, is of interest.
