THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

profitable to open them, or altogether reasonable to ask private capital to open them at a venture. It should take action to make it certain that transportation at reasonable rates will be promptly provided; and when the carriage has become sufficiently profitable to attract and engage private capital in abundance, the government ought to withdraw.

A thorough survey of the coasts, especially that of Alaska, was urged. Wilson held that this must be done to safeguard lines, and make coastwise commerce less a hazard.

"The duty of economy is not debatable," said the president. "It is manifest and imperative. In the appropriations we pass we are spending the money of the great people whose servants we are—not our own. I assert with the greatest confidence that the people of the United States are not jealous of the amount their government costs if they are sure that they get what they need and desire for the outlay, that the money is being spent for objects of which they approve, with good business sense and management.

"The sort of economy we ought to practice may be effected, and ought to be effected, by a careful study and assessment of the tasks to be performed, and the money spent ought to be made to yield the best possible returns in efficiency and achievement. And, like good stewards, we should account for every dollar of our appropriation.

"The other topic I shall take leave to mention goes deeper into the principles of our national life and policy. It is the subject of national defense.

"It cannot be discussed without first answering some very searching questions. It is said in some quarters that we are not prepared for war. What is meant by being prepared? Is it meant that we are not ready upon brief notice to put a nation in the field, a nation of men trained to arms?

"Of course we are not ready to do that; and we shall never be in time of peace so long as we retain our present political principles and institutions. And what is it that is suggested we should be prepared to do? To defend ourselves against attack? We have always found means to do that, and shall find them whenever it is necessary, without calling our people away from their tasks to render compulsory military service in times of peace.

"We are at peace with all the world. No one who speaks counsel based on fact can say that there is reason to fear that from any quarter our independence or the integrity of our territory is threatened. Dread of the power of any nation we are incapable of.

"We are not jealous of rivalry in the fields of commerce or of any other peaceful achievement. We mean to live our own lives as we will; but we mean also to let live. We are, indeed, a true friend to all the nations of the world, because we threaten none, covet the possessions of none, desire the overthrow of none.

"Therein lies our greatness. We are the champions of peace and of concord. And we should be very jealous of this distinction which we have sought to earn. Just now we should be particularly jealous of it, because it is our dearest present hope that this character and reputation may presently, in God's providence, bring us an opportunity such has seldom been vouchsafed, bring us an opportunity to council and obtain peace in the world and reconciliation and a healing settlement of many a matter that has cooled and interrupted the friendship of nations.

"From the first we have had a clear and settled policy with regard to military establishments. We never have had, and while we retain our present principles and ideals, we never shall have, a large standing army. If asked, are you ready to defend yourselves? We answer: Most assuredly, to the utmost! And yet we shall not turn America into a military camp. We will not ask our young men to spend the best years of their lives making soldiers of themselves.

"Let us remind ourselves, therefore, of the only thing we can do or will do. We must depend in every time of national peril in the future, as in the past, not upon a standing army, nor yet upon a reserve army, but upon a citizenry trained and accustomed to arms.

"It will be right enough, right American policy, based on our accustomed principles and practices, to provide a system by which every citizen who will volunteer for training may be made familiar with the use of modern arms, and the rudiments of drill and maneuver, and the maintenance and sanitation of camps. We should encourage such training and make it a means of discipline which our young men will learn and value. It is right that we should provide it not only, but that we should make it as attractive as possible, and so induce our young men to undergo it at such times as they can command a little freedom and can seek the physical development they need for mere health's sake, if for nothing more. Every means by which such things can be stimulated is legitimate and such a method smacks of true American ideals.

"It is right, too, that the national guard of the state should be developed and strengthened by every means which is not inconsistent with our obligation to our own people or with the established policy of our government. And this, also, not because the time or occasion especially calls for such measures, but because it should be our constant policy to make the provisions for our national peace and safety."

Speaking of the army and navy question, Wilson said:

"We shall not alter our attitude toward it because some amongst us are nervous and excited. We shall easily and sensibly agree upon a policy of defense. The question has not changed its aspect because the times are not normal. Our policy will not be for an occasion. Let there be no misconception. The country has been misinformed. We have not been negligent of national defense. We are not unmindful of the great responsibility resting upon us. We shall learn and profit by the lesson of every experience and every new circumstance, and what is needed will be adequately done.

"I close, as I began, by reminding you of the great tasks and duties of peace which challenge our best powers and invite us to build what will last.

"To develop our life and our resources, to supply our own people, and the people of the world as their need arises, from the abundant plenty of our fields and our marts of trade, to enrich the commerce of our states and of the world with the products of our mines, our farms and our factories, with the creations of our thought and the fruits of our character—that is what will hold our attention and our enthusiasm steadily, now and in the years to come, as we strive to show in our life as a nation what liberty and the inspirations of an emancipated spirit may do for men and societies, for individuals, for states and for mankind."

The common council of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, having ascertained and determined the proportionate share for which each lot, part of lot, block and acreage property shall be liable for the improvement of Third street from Main street to California avenue, and having on the 16th day of November, 1914, filed in the office of the Police Judge of said city a statement thereof, which said statement is known and designated as the "PROPOSED ASSESSMENT ROLL" for said improvement.
