NEUTRALITY IN PEACE NEEDED

IN THE MOVING picture theaters now, with all war pictures, is displayed an autograph request from the President of the United States that the spectators observe silence and thereby preserve neutrality as the war scenes are shown. In consequence there is a total absence of demonstration. In truth, there is little in the ordinary war pictures to stir an audience up to a sudden flow of enthusiasm. But, even if there were, that our neutrality would be observed is fair to assume. In fact, often we not applaud even the American flag when it appears upon the screen.

But, if there is a neutrality of war, why not a neutrality of peace? If a neutrality in affairs abroad, why not a neutrality concerning things at home? If a neutrality as between nations, why not a neutrality between men?

When the world comes back to its senses, when the country gets back to normal again, perhaps it would be well for presidents to preach and for others to practice some such neutrality as that—dealing even-handed justice to labor and farmer and retailer and even the hated capitalist, without fear or favor, but especially without fear.

TAKE IT OUT OF POLITICS

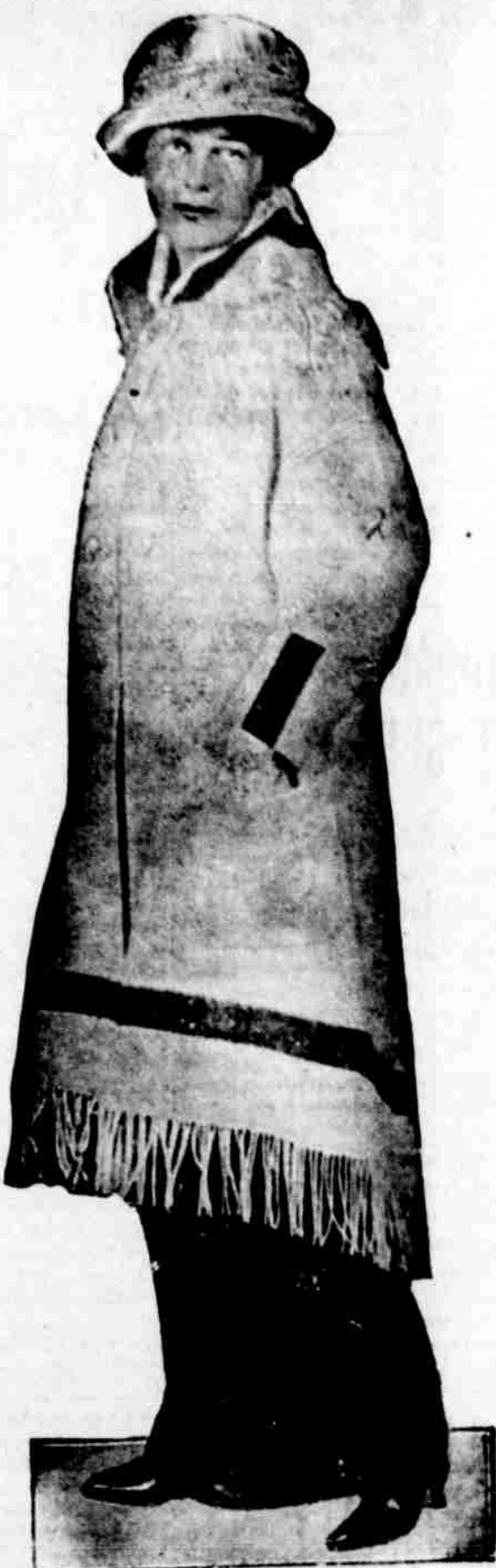
THE State Reform School, with only 88 boys in custody on November 1st, has cost \$23.25 per month per boy for the past year. The appropriations for the past two years were \$73,450, or \$835 per capita for the biennial period.

The buildings are large enough for five times as many inmates, and the farm is one of the largest owned by the state. The cost of administration and management has been \$8.55 per boy per month—about double that of other institutions.

Governor West and others contend that a majority of the boys would be better off at home. From its origin this institution has been made the football of politics.

During the past few years a reform management has tried to make improvements, but has not been very successful. Superintendent Hale was a Y. M. C. A. worker and a young man of the best intentions, but not a professional reform school manager. There is a growing feeling that this institution should be abolished unless

"Armed Neutrality" Is the Attitude Taken by Italians

While Not Involved in the European War, Times Have Not Been a Whit Dull in the Boot-Shaped Nation's Political Circles

DOMODOSOLA, (Italian Frontier) Nov. 3.—(By mail to New York).—With a thoroughly and unanimously homogenous cabinet, for the first time since the outbreak of the present European war, Premier Salandra is today working feverishly for Italy's ultimate participation in the great conflict.

"Armed neutrality, with 1,000,000 men mobilized, to the end that Italy does not lose any rights, advantages accruing to her by reason of her neutrality." This is Italy's present motto.

Reduced to their maximum terms, Italy's advantages and rights accruing to her by reason of her neutrality, means the redemption of the two Italian provinces of Trieste and Trent—Italy's "Alsace and Lorraine"—and the permanent occupation of Valloona on the Adriatic.

Reduced to their maximum terms, these "rights and advantages" mean the passing into Italy's possession of at least enough of the northern and eastern coast of Adriatic to insure for all time to come that she will be mistress of that sea.

In the maintaining and holding of these "rights and advantages" Italy will have the solid support of the Triple Entente. That has been officially assured. It was assured even, before England consented to supply Italy with coal and other necessities while the war is in progress.

In the event of the success of the Triple Entente, it is already an established fact that the three powers will not allow any portion of the Adriatic coast to remain in the hands of Austria which might eventually,

either through treaty right, the unification of Austria and Germany, or other means, afford Germany a port on the Adriatic. The only other countries to whom this can go are Serbia and Italy, and Italy does not propose that Serbia get all.

Although as a matter of fact, this was the policy of Premier Salandra from the beginning of the war, a lack of harmony in his cabinet made it impossible for him to work effectively to that end. First of all, the late Marchese de San Giuliano, minister of foreign affairs, was one of alliance with Germany and Austria. He sincerely and conscientiously believed that Italy could not turn against them. Under the strain of the fight when he managed to keep up for two months, he died. Premier Salandra took over his portfolio for the time.

Another obstacle in Premier Salandra's first cabinet, was General Grandi, minister of war. The chief of staff of the army, declaring Italy utterly unprepared for war, demanded immense sums for an immediate preparation of troop mobilization Salandra succeeded in getting, but these sums Minister of War Grandi declined to spend. Finally he resigned. General Zuppoli, fully in sympathy with the premier's views, was then substituted.

But still another obstacle developed in the cabinet. The \$200,000,000 which Premier and War ministers of Finance Rubini were willing to give, but only on condition that it was approved in the usual bureaucratic way by a bill through Parliament. Salandra insisted that the exceptional crisis warranted exceptional measures upon Rubini, still rejecting, re-

sisted. The resignations of the entire cabinet were presented at the same time.

Then King Victor Emmanuel, evidently also in sympathy with the views of Premier Salandra, charged him to form a new cabinet. This Salandra did and now for the first time since the outbreak of the war he is entirely surrounded with colleagues in sympathy with his views that Italy cannot afford to see the map of Europe readjusted without the realization, at least in part, of her dream of the past fifty years.

Salandra now has at his disposal the \$200,000,000 necessary for Italy's thorough preparation. The press of Italy is also demanding that the mobilization be increased to 1,000,000. In general, however, it is not believed this will be done until the actual moment when it is up to Italy to take possession of the provinces she desires—the provinces that have been openly offered her by Russia and England—and hold them if it is necessary by force.

Italy at the present time has 500,000 men under arms. These form the nucleus of all the units that would be engaged in a war calling for her full mobilization. They have already completed every detail of the organization so that the final call to arms merely means the filling out numerically of these units already on a basis of war. For that reason further mobilization at the present time would only mean an additional expense without any advantage.

In any event, Italy considers herself ready from now on, and she will be fully prepared, fully organized and ready to act when the psychological moment arrives.

CAMERA HUNTING ONLY IN OREGON

BIOLOGICAL SURVEY REPORT

SHOWS FILMING OF BIRDS ALLOWED ON MALHEUR, KLAMATH AND CLEAR LAKES

In the annual report on national bird reservations, the biological survey of the Department of Agriculture has the following regarding "movies" taken in the reserves:

A novel and important feature in connection with the reservations has been the taking of moving pictures of bird life. Permits to "hunt with the camera" are granted only after eggs have hatched, and operators are allowed to work only when accompanied by a warden, in order that the birds may not be unduly disturbed.

The three reservations visited for this purpose were Malheur Lake and Klamath Lake, Oregon, and Clear Lake, California.

The following from Pelican Island, Florida, will be of interest here: An extraordinary phenomenon on

Pelican Island reservation, following an unusually early nesting, was the desertion of the young birds by their parents before they were able to care for themselves. Investigation failed to give a satisfactory solution of the cause of this singular action upon the part of the parent birds. Pelicans are usually devoted parents.

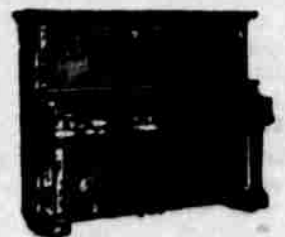
