LOWER TAXES, CHEAPER LAND

It is acknowledged by all who are anxious for the development of the state that the problem is to get more people upon the land. To accomplish this, more industries, lower taxes and cheaper lands are the great essentials.

Few persons realize how slowly the lands of Oregon are settling up, until they look the facts squarely in the face and remember that 67 per cent of the area of Oregon is government owned and controlled land.

The census of 1910 shows that while the cities and towns increased in population in ten years 213,160, the rural territory increased in ten years only 45,069, or about 4,607 per year added to the farming population.

During the ten years from 1900 to 1910, Portland increased in population 116,738, while all other cities and towns increased only 96,372, and it must be remembered a great deal in the gain of cities and towns was from the country.

The reports sent out by the State Labor Commissioner that Oregon has 800,000 population are misleading and not based upon real development of the lands which are largely government owned and not open to settlement.

THE MUSIC OF WAR

IN THE January Woman's Home Companion, Charles E. Jefferson, pastor of Broadway Tabernacle, New York city, writes a war article entitled "A Continent on Fire," an interesting extract from which follows:

Condition of American Shop Girls Worse Than Belgians

To Buy Clothes, One Stints Meals. One Girl's Vacation Was Spent in Skylight Room. Another Sees the "Red Lights Getting Pinker Each Year"

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—"When I have to pay for a pair of shoes or something like that, I don't buy meat for weeks at a time."

This little sentence from the testimony of a girl clerk in a New York Department store is full of meaning as the reflection of "how the other half lives." It was told to the New York State Factory Investigating Committee, and was one of many statements which brought home to many of Manhattan's citizens the fact that all the suffering in the world is not in Europe today.

"You see yourself that the only thing left me to economize on is food," said another clerk, "I never eat any breakfast at all. By experience I found that was the easiest meal to do without."

One young lady of 31 years spent her vacations, one week every year, in her skylight bedroom—just one of those rooms, which O'Henry describes—resting up after a year's hard grind. But the pathetic note when she said that she hurried down to the store every morning during her vacation to see that some one else had not been given her job.

There was one girl who found ingenious way to buy new suits of clothes for herself, which she did by the process of elimination. She eliminated one, and sometimes two meals a day. When it was not necessary to buy new clothes she paid

ten cents for her breakfast, 15 cents for her lunch and then 25 cents for a real banquet in the evening.

The testimony of the two Buffalo women was interesting. One of the women said that she lived two and three days on a little cold ham and a can of beans. Another, a young widow living in a questionable district, works for a wage of six dollars a week, clerking and has a little room in a lodging house not far from Buffalo's red-light district. The lights are not yet red where she lives, but she said, "the lights are getting pinker every year."

In a few cases the Salamander type of girl, the type made famous by the Salamander who has gentlemen friends, not for the good time and the expensive luxuries, but for the real necessities. Said one of them, "Gee! but I feel sorry for the girls who haven't got a steady," she said, "Why, if I had to buy all my meals, I'd never get along. Sunday dinner I always count on him for."

Well, the substance of the testimony was that State Factory Commission through its agents, Miss Esther Packard, Miss Mary Van Kleeck, Roswell Skeel, Jr., Mrs. Marie Orenstein and others, showed that out of a total of 104 wage earners investigated by the Commission, one-eighth earn less than \$5 a week; one-third less than \$7; two-thirds receive \$10 or less and only one-sixth make \$15 or more. Half

of the wage earners get less than \$5 a week.

It does not make pleasant reading, this thought that a girl omits a meal or two a day to buy herself a coat to keep off the cold weather. But many of them do it.

PORTLAND, Dec. 14.—The Pacific International Livestock Exposition and the center of the limelight last week, and all trading was done quickly, so as to make way for show attractions.

Outside of show stock receipts were light. Best steers were selling at \$7.10, good steers going at \$7 and cows at around \$6.

A record run of hogs Monday took nearly all the available hog space in the yards. Nearly 8,000 head were counted in. Prices fluctuated during the week, opening at \$7, and then dropping 10 cents. Strength was again gained, and Friday closed at \$7.10.

Sheep receipts have been very light and still show a decrease under last year. Prices are very strong, lambs going at \$7.50, ewes at \$5, and yearling wethers at \$6.
