SAFETY FIRST

ACCORDING to men who should be well posted on immigration, more than 2,000,000 aliens a year will flock to this country after the end of the war in Europe. With the enormous number already idle in this country, we will not be able to assimilate this tremendous influx.

Of course, there will be some persons of wealth and refinement among the aliens, but the greater number will be persons without any means. No provision being made to transport these people from seaboard to the interior, they will become a charge upon the seacoast towns and communities, and in the large cities may become a menace. It will result in a lowering of the wages of the working classes because the famished emigrants will be only too glad to work for anything to keep soul and body together.

The congress now in session should take this matter up at once, and enact such legislation as will first give protection to our own people, and at the same time not exclude desirable immigrants.

Prevention is better than cure, and in this case it will be advisable to anticipate what may become a disaster later.

The war will leave millions absolutely destitute, and they will be in a half savage state, many verging upon barbarism. Under our existing lack of law enforcement thousands of the most undesirable will be permitted to land and to remain in the cities to add to the criminal ranks. The figures are rather staggering, but they are the predictions of experts and of students of the immigration problem.

Impoverished and burdened by enormous war debts, the masses of the countries now at war will naturally flee from further militarism, and this is the only country offering them a haven.

Let us first protect ourselves, and try to prevent undesirables from coming by the million.

Jess Willard, Who Is to Fight Johnson



Here is the agreement between Jack Curley, the Chicago promoter, and Jack Johnson, the black champion, for a fight for the championship of the world. Curley went to London in November, to which city Johnson had gone, despite his assertions of French patriotism, and there got the big black to agree to meet the American giant. The fight will be held in the latter part of March, and will run from twenty to forty-five rounds, according to the decision of Curley. He has not yet chosen a place for the contest. It may go to Mexico or Cuba. Had not the women of California voted in favor of the constitutional amendment to abolish boxing there, the Golden Gate state might have got the match. As it is, Americans, who are chiefly interested, will probably have to go a long distance to see the fight. The agreement follows:

This agreement, made on the 16th day of November, one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, between Jack Curley of New York City, U. S. A. of the first part, and Jack Johnson, at present of London, England, of the second part.

Whereby it is agreed as follows:

1—The said Jack Johnson agrees with the said Jack Curley to engage Marquis Queensberry rules, with five-ounce gloves, with one Jess Willard of America. The said contest to be scheduled for from twenty rounds to forty-five rounds at the direction and discretion of the said Jack Curley.

2—The party hereto of the second part to be allowed to wear soft bandages on his hands, if he so desires.

3—The party hereto of the first part agrees to promote said contest and to pay the party hereto of the second part for his services the sum of \$30,000 (thirty thousand dollars) in American legal tender. And further agrees to pay him one-half of

the net amount received from the moving pictures to be taken of the contest.

4—The party hereto of the first part agrees to select the location for the contest not later than Feb. 1, 1915, and to notify the party of the second part in writing or by cable, care American Express Co., London, unless otherwise requested by the said Jack Johnson.

5—The party hereto of the first part agrees to hold the contest between March 15 and March 30, 1915, and to notify the party hereto of the second part the exact date not less than one lunar month before the match.

A LITTLE SPORTING GOSSIP

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—Something over fifty baseball players who once did their cowering in the big leagues are on the rolls of and receiving salaries from the many times dead, dying or buried Federal League.

Abandon the Auto
The snow is reported to be over a foot deep on the mountain between the Newell station and Bly, and the stage company is now using horses and sleighs between those points. The auto stage continues to operate between Lakeview and the Drews Valley station—Lake County Examiner.

All on a Carload?
Thousands of English, French, Russian and Indian soldiers engaged in the European war will be given Rogue River Valley apples as a treat from the English government Christmas day. According to a report received in this city, which is authentic, small baskets of the fruit will be given to each soldier. Rogue River Valley apples will be placed in each basket. A carload of fruit will be shipped from the valley immediately—Medford Sun.

Booze Runs in Street
One hundred and eighty dead soldiers is the net result of the engagement between old General Boozie and Marshal Williams and Night Officer Ketch. Although there was a good deal of shooting from those who were out of firing distance and on the side lines, the actual conflict created no uproar. More than 300 people gathered in front of the city hall to witness the destruction of two barrels of beer, 24 quarts and 12 pints of whiskey which were captured from J. M. Spanzake a few days ago—Roseburg News.

May Be Best Factory
At a mass meeting of farmers and fruit growers at the Natatorium, P. H. Bramwell, representing Utah and Eastern sugar manufacturers, outlined the terms under which his company will construct a beet sugar factory in Medford. Five thousand acres for sugar beet cultivation are desired. The company binds itself for five years to purchase all the beets grown at 14.50 f. o. b. railroad track, or \$5 f. o. b. plant. The plant will involve an investment exceeding \$400,000—Medford Mail Tribune.
