POOR OLD MEXICO

IF MEXICO has an abundance of anything these days, it is an ample supply of presidents, for there are at least four who claim to be the only real executive—and rumor has it that Huerta is figuring on returning to try to regain control. Thus far, though, there seems to be no man available who has sufficient executive ability, although great hopes were expressed when the recent convention of factions met to decide upon a national head.

The smallness of President Carranza came to light at that time, when he refused to resign in favor of Gutierrez, the convention's choice. He is still president, in his own estimation, but his capital is now at Vera Cruz.

It is just about a year ago that the "watchful waiting" policy of President Wilson started. By refusing to recognize Huerta's presidency, which, no matter by how sordid means it was secured, was in force before Wilson became president, Wilson made other nations hesitate regarding recognition, and in this way did much to block any attempts to better Mexican conditions by use of foreign capital.

The fighting against Huerta started, Wilson sent a number of regiments to border points to see that the neutrality of the United States would be protected, and that there would be no smuggling of arms over the line. And then when the revolutionists seemed assured of defeating the Huertists and the Huerta troops were far from the border, the embargo on shipments of munitions of war over the line was raised, so the rebels were given full opportunity to secure all the equipment they needed for the crushing of Huerta.

Then, in addition to the troops along the border, naval vessels were sent to Mexican ports. A small detachment from an American vessel was arrested and temporarily detained at Tampico. Huerta's officers offered profuse apologies.

But this was not enough. It was demanded that Huerta fire a salute to the American flag. A salute to the American flag by an administration not recognized by the United States. The salute was not fired. After some more "watchful waiting," the second Mexican war began. War, because marines and sailors from American cruisers made a landing, seized Vera Cruz, the principal seaport of Mexico, and held it for seven months. A war in which there was loss of life by Americans and Mexicans, and in which much Vera Cruz property was damaged by the guns of the warships.

This was the army of pacification. Its pacification work was apparently occupation until Huerta was eliminated, for at the time the present revolution was started—a few days before Carranza and his followers fled to Vera Cruz.

Now, after this watchful waiting, and display of military force, things are in the same condition as they were before. The fighting is raging between two factions along the border, and a lot of the bullets are flying across the line, some of them wounding Americans. After several forceful statements from General Bliss, in command at Naco, more American troops have been sent there, and there is now on the way to him, sealed instructions, believed to be orders to return any damaging fire.

And affairs are practically where they were early in April of this year.

Poor old Mexico.

WHAT SOLDIERS CARRY

NEARLY all the soldiers belonging to European armies have to carry about with them in the field a kit which ranges in weight from 35 to 61 pounds.

The equipment that the different soldiers carry about with them is very similar. It generally comprises a rifle

and bayonet, with rags and so on for keeping them clean, an intrenching tool, and, of course, a number of rounds of ammunition. Then there are the various articles of clothing, with changes, and a first aid outfit.

All the soldiers with one exception carry a knife, fork and spoon, water bottle and mess tin. The Russians, who are the exception, carry a wooden spoon only, which they keep in their boots. There is also a supply of food carried, and generally one or two reserve or emergency rations.

Together with an overcoat and the knapsack and similar accouterments, the load to be carried is considerable. The Russians carry most, the weight working out at 61 pounds, while the British, French and Germans come next in order, carrying weights of 47, 44 and 38 pounds, respectively.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—It would be a little difficult to decide whether roller skating comes under the head of sport or pleasure—or both. At any rate, the carnival now in progress at Madison Square Garden is furnishing some keen competition and some fun as well.

The present carnival, which will last three days, is a revival for roller skating in this city. There was a time, several years ago, when it was considered quite the thing to skate, and well appointed rinks came into existence all over the country.

For some reason or other, however, the rinks closed down after a year or two of amazing prosperity, and movie houses and maxie palaces have succeeded them.

Amusement men in Manhattan are

watching, therefore, with keen interest the success of the Garden venture. And the management of the latter has gone to considerable expense to make an attractive background—or foot-ground, if you will—for the skaters.

A specially prepared track with long flat stretches and high banks was put up recently for the comfort and as an encouragement for greater speed for the racers in the twenty-four hour race. Excellent living quarters were erected by the side of the track, with kitchens and snug sleeping bunks.

That these preparations were appreciated, too, was shown by the good lists of teams entered, when no less than fifteen from various sections showed their willingness to take part. And not the least of all is the \$5,000 prize money.
