IT IS TIME TO CUT DOWN EXPENSES

WHILE the taxpayers are suffering from stagnation caused by the war in Europe, it is no time to squander the people's money. Congressmen should reduce expenditures to the smallest limit, without impairing any meritorious project.

The average citizen is feeling the pinch of hard times, even though his income has not been cut down, because his expenses have been increased by the stamp tax and in other ways.

The country is beginning to regain its equilibrium after the sudden jolt it was given by the awful war now raging, nevertheless, all lines have not resumed, and in the cotton growing sections the people are financially embarrassed.

It is the habit of congress to vote away the money with no thought of the results to the masses. Each community should have some of the "buck," as the appropriation for public buildings is called, and others demand money for the development of waterways, much of which is direct waste.

Then come the advocates of a big standing army and a great navy asking for more millions, in fact, there is an insistent demand for an outpouring of money wrung from the common people.

It should be the duty of congress to spend the public money as they would their own, bearing in mind that these are abnormal times, and it is advisable to curtail expenses and to eliminate all extravagances.

Something might happen which would call for an emergency appropriation. For this reason the country will expect the lawmakers to be economical, even if the next election is a long way off.

Present War Recalls Poem Written in 1838

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 22.—Declaring he had sought long for a poem beginning "An Austrian army, awfully arrayed," a Californian recently wrote here to the New York State library for the verses. Within ten minutes from the time of his letter's receipt the poem, entitled "Siege of Belgrade," and supposed to have been written in 1838 by Rev. B. Poulter, Presbyter of Westminster, had been found and forwarded to the Californian. In view of the present European struggle the verses are interesting at this time. They are as follows:

An Austrian army, awfully arrayed,
Boldly by battery besieged Belgrade;
Cossack commanders cannonading come,
Dealing destruction's devastating doom;
Every endeavor engineers essay,
For fame, for fortune—fighting, furious fray—
Generals 'gainst generals grapple—gracious God!
How honors Heaven heroic hardihood!
Infuriate, indiscriminate in ill,
Kinmen kill kinmen—kinmen kindred kill!
Labor low levels loftiest, longest lives;
Men march 'mid mounds, 'mid moles, 'mid murderous mines.
Now noisy, noxious numbers notice nought
Of outward obstacles opposing ought;
Poor patriots, partly purchased, partly pressed,
Quite quaking, quickly quarter quarter quest.
Reason returns, religious right redounds,
Sorrow stops such sanguinary sounds;
Truce to thee, Turkey, triumph to thy train!
Unjust, unwise, unmerciful Ukraine!
Vanish vain victory! Vanish victory vain!
Why wish we warfare? Wherefore welcome war,
Xerxes, Ximenes, Xanthus, Xaviers?
Yield, ye youths! ye youths, yield your yell!
Zeno's, Zarpatus', Zoraster's zeal,
And all attracting—arms against appeal.

George A. Post has just been re-elected president of the Railway Business Association, an organization which represents \$500,000,000 of capital. This was the toast he gave at the dinner following his re-election: "Here's to railway regulation. May

those who enact and those who administer the laws be as watchful of the welfare of the railroads as they are zealous in the protection of the rights of the public. Injury to either is destructive of the prosperity of both."

The official biography of Mr. Post describes the organization of the association as follows: "Several years ago, when railroads and the government were well 'at it,' in the regulation row, a party of very substantial business men who had been playing the part of innocent bystanders, found it necessary to dodge a cluster of legislative brickbats which had struck the railroads and had shied off in their direction. Some of those innocent bystanders, recalling the proverbial fate of such participants in fights, decided to commence peace negotiations, and, as the underdog was a very good friend of theirs, they started the fight for peace from his side of the ring. The under dog, as we all know, was the railroads. The innocent bystanders were manufacturers of railway equipment, material and supplies. This, in the language of two and two makes four, was the beginning of an organization which today represents capital amounting to \$500,000,000.
