Whereas, Trout and other fish frequenting Klamath River and Spencer Creek and its tributaries, in Klamath county, state of Oregon, are being threatened with extinction from excessive angling; and,

Whereas, the state board of fish and game commissioners of the state of Oregon is and has been stocking said Klamath River and Spencer Creek and its tributaries, in Klamath county, state of Oregon, with trout; and,

Whereas, the state board of fish and game commissioners of the state of Oregon is desirous of protecting the trout and other fish frequenting the waters of said Klamath River, and Spencer Creek and its tributaries, in Klamath county, state of Oregon; now, therefore,

Notice is hereby given by said state board of fish and game commissioners of the state of Oregon that all of said Klamath River from a point 200 feet below the lowermost portion of the confluence of said Klamath River and Spencer Creek, to a point 200 feet above the uppermost portion of the confluence of said streams; also that portion of said Spencer Creek and its tributaries, in Klamath county, state of Oregon, between the confluence of said Spencer Creek and Klamath River, and a point on said Spencer Creek 500 feet above the dam across said Spencer Creek on or adjacent to property now leased and occupied by the state of Oregon for hatchery purposes, described as follows:

"Beginning south 54 deg. 30 min. east 1146 feet from the northwest corner of Section 29, in Township

29 south, Range 7 east of the Willamette Meridian; thence north 5 deg. east 1528 feet; thence east 150 feet; thence south 47 deg. 40 min. east 290 feet; thence south 5 deg. 20 min. west 544 feet; thence south 5 deg. east 678 feet; thence south 84 deg. 57 min. west 588 feet, to place of beginning, in Klamath county, state of Oregon." Are and each of them is hereby closed to fishing of any kind for trout or other fish from and after January 10, 1915, until said portions of Klamath River and Spencer Creek and its tributaries are opened to angling again by an order of the board, as by statute provided.
