INTEREST YOUR FRIENDS

JANUARY 27th, the voters of Klamath Falls will be asked to decide whether or not the city charter should be amended to empower the council to negotiate with the government for the acquisition of the Ankeny canal. It is up to each of us, therefore, to see that there is a big turnout at the polls that day, in order to make possible the closing of this waterway, which for years has been a menace to the health of the city.

The Ankeny canal, no doubt, has been blamed for more than its share of illness, but nobody can say that it cannot be blamed for any. One look at certain parts of it, the bottom filled with stagnant water, old moss, decaying vegetation, old cans and other rubbish, is enough to convince even the most skeptical that it is an ideal disease breeding spot, and that as long as it exists in its present condition it is a danger to health.

In order to take any steps toward the close of this ditch, the council must be empowered to do so by a change in the charter of the city. A proposed amendment, which would allow this, has been prepared, and last night the council passed an ordinance submitting the question to the people at a special election. To insure its passage, it is necessary that the people be acquainted with the crying need for the closing of this ditch, so the success of the campaign, from now on, is up to his honor, Mr. Private Citizen, or his good wife.

Notice of Proportionate Assessment of Property Liable for the Cost of Improving Third Street from Main Street to California Avenue.

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, did by ordinance duly adopted on the 15th day of December, 1914, and approved by the mayor on the 23d day of December, 1914, declare the proportionate assessment upon each lot, part of lot, block and acreage property benefited and liable for the cost of improving Third street from Main street to California avenue, including intersections.

The boundaries within which the property lies upon which such assessments were so declared and ordered docketed are particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Third and Main streets in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, thence in an easterly direction along the boundary line of Main street to the intersection of the boundary line between lots 2 and 3 in block 18 of the original town of Linkville, now Klamath Falls, Oregon; running thence in a northerly direction between lots 2 and 3 and 4 and 7 in said block 18 and along the lines between lots 2 and 3 and 6 and 7, in block 7 of the original town of Linkville, now city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, to the intersection of High street; thence in an easterly direction along the center line of High street to the intersection of Fifth street; thence northerly along the center line of Fifth street to the intersection of Mitchell street; thence southwesterly along the center line of Mitchell street to the intersection of Mount Whitney street; thence westerly along the center line of Mount Whitney street to the center line of California avenue; thence southwesterly along the center line of California street or avenue to the intersection of Teddy street; thence along the center line of Teddy street to the intersection of second street; thence southeasterly along the center line of Second street to the intersection of McKinley street; thence south to the center line of First street; thence southeasterly along the center line of First street to the intersection with High street; thence northeasterly along the center line of
