OTHER SIDE IS TOLD BY YOUTHS

**FOUR OF THE MEN WHO PAID
FINES ON ACCOUNT OF THE
CHRISTMAS DISTURBANCE SAY
HOW THEY SAW AFFAIR**

Editor Herald:

There have been several stories in
circulation concerning the fight at
Gray's Hall at Pine Grove Christmas
night, most of them indicating that it
was a free-for-all, so in justice to our-
selves, we wish to make the following
explanation.

Five of us, Van Cornish, Linn
Smith, Merrill Archer, M. M. Shan-

non and Jack Renton went to the
dance to enjoy ourselves, not with
any intention of fighting, or looking
for fights. We admit that we had
drank a little, but we were not intoxi-
cated. We state further that there
were several of the Olene bunch on
the floor that were drunk.

There were several fights during
the evening, both inside and outside
of the hall. Smith and Henry Stiles
had some words, but they shook
hands and decided that Christmas
was not the time for a fight. Far
from fighting, Smith was kept busy
during the evening separating some
of those who were indulged in scrap-
ing. He was called outside several
times to part some who were about
to mix-it.

Later in the evening, Stiles began
making inquiries for Smith among
some of the men. He kept this up
so much that Archer, who is a close
friend of Smith, asked if he wouldn't
do just as well. Stiles replied that
he would, and after some more words,
Stiles struck at Archer, and Archer
hit him in return. Stiles then

came back at Archer with a knife,
cutting him in several places.

At the time that Archer and Stiles
were in action, Smith was outside,
engaged in trying to separate an-
other fight. Cornish and Shan-
non were inside dancing while the
trouble occurred. As soon as we
learned of trouble, Smith, Cornish
and Renton put Archer in the car we
had rented, driven by J. A. Thompson
and brought him here for medical
treatment. That was about midnight.

Before the auto left, two men in
the hall were about to engage in a
fight, when Shannon suggested to
them that they leave the hall. Smith
also urged them to leave, and after
getting them outside Smith and Shan-
non succeeded in getting them to
shake hands. As Smith and Shan-
non walked toward the gate with one
of the men, Mr. Gray came out and
ordered them to leave the place.

After Archer, Smith, Renton and
Cornish went to Klamath Falls, Shan-
non remained at the dance until 1:30,
when he returned with Louis Hoag-
land to Klamath Falls. If there were

any more fights before he left, Shan-
non did not see them.

Mr. Gray's charge against us was
that we were drunk and disorderly,
and broke up a public gathering.
We know that after we left they
danced until 5 o'clock in the morning.

When we were arrested and brought
before Justice of the Peace Gowen,
we were given to understand by him
that he would make our fines and
costs very light if we would plead
guilty. Anxious to get the matter set-
tled as soon as possible, and without
further trouble, we did this today,
but we consider that we were fined
excessively—even more than the fines
should have been if we had fought
the charge. Furthermore, we be-
lieve that we should have been given
a chance to tell our side of the story
in court before we were fined. This,
Gowen refused to let Smith do, ask-
ing none of us, if we had a word to
say in our own behalf.

We feel that if anybody should
have received a heavy fine, it should
have been Stiles, who used the knife
on Archer, but he got off the lightest

of anybody. Why should Shannon
and Smith be fined more than the
rest of them, when they did no fight-
ing, but only tried to stop some of it?
The Judge would not tell us this.

Also, why didn't Mr. Gray arrest
some of his friends who were drunk
and fighting?
