LITTLE STORIES FROM THE FRONT THAT ARE COMING IN THROUGH THE CAPITALS OF THE NATIONS NOW FIGHTING EACH OTHER—SOME ARE TRIVIAL, BUT ALL ARE INTERESTING AT THIS TIME.

GENEVA, Dec. 3.—(By mail to New York)—A stranded American tourist in Switzerland nearly brought about the death of a friend living in Germany by sending him the following telegram:

"Kale all gone. Wire thirty beans." The German censor took it to mean that some German town, Kiel, probably, had been attacked and wiped out. The person to whom the wire was addressed was arrested as a spy, and probably would have been shot if, luckily, a German officer who had lived in America hadn't been able to convince the authority that the message was merely a request for monetary aid.

PARIS.—(By mail to New York)—When the Germans entered Conde sur Escout, say the Paris papers, they tried to pull down a statue erected there to the memory of the popular French general, Pothou de Saint Marie. Fifty men with ropes tugged at the monument, but were unable to budge it. Losing their tempers, they then fired hundreds of shots at the figure, but the bullets only flattened themselves against the solid bronze with little effect. The municipality of Conde has now decided to leave the marks of the German bullets undisturbed as a standing "testimony to German importance to break French resistance."

NEW YORK, Jan. 1.—Looking into the 1914 pugilistic mirror here, it is noted that while most of the fistic stars gave a good account of themselves, there were really no sensational overthrows or changes in the leaders. Another much noted fact is there were no fake fights, and in those cases where bouts turned out disappointing it can be traced to a star meeting a dub.

In the heavyweight class the sensation of the last season was the Sailor Fritts-Al Reich bout, in which Reich put over a clean knockout in the tenth round.

In the middleweight class nothing noteworthy of mention happened except that Mike Gibbons did not lose any of his color. Although George Chip was knocked out by Al McCoy in April by a fluke punch, the fight was far too tame and short to create much attention.

In the featherweight class Champion Kilbane knocked his knees to-

gether while he awaited some promoter to offer him a match.

In the bantamweight class Champion Williams continued to be the only only. In his one appearance here Williams easily outclassed Dutch Brandt.

The McVey-Johnson, Gibbons-Maxwell and the Gibbons-Donovan bouts were the only ones discrediting to the fight game last season.

The honor of putting up the best fight in which the spectators received their full money's worth goes to Leach Cross and Gilbert Gallant. The fight between these two lightweights was hard and fairly full to overflowing with spectacular features.

The worst fiasco of the past twelve months was between Al McCoy and Billy Murray of California. During this bout in June, McCoy turned his back on the willing although inexperienced Californian and refused to fight. Murray was awarded the fight by popular opinion, although the affair would have put to disgrace the rank amateur.

the traffic this coming summer and fall is expected to be at least ten times as heavy as in former years. For the accommodation of these tourists, Klamath Falls has the best hotels between Portland and San Francisco. For the accommodation of the parties that visit Crater Lake, the Crater Lake Company early in the summer will complete the stone and timber hostelry at the rim of the Lake, a hotel that will give all the comforts of the city in the heart of Nature's most weird wilderness.

Uncle Sam is doing his part, toward the attracting the tourists, for a most comprehensive system of highways is being constructed through Crater Lake National Park under the direction of the U. S. Engineer Corps.

A short time ago the Lamin Lumber Company was sold 26,000,000 feet of timber on the shore of Upper Klamath Lake. This must be cut off in a limited number of years, so machinery is now arriving, and a logging railroad is being constructed to carry timber to a big sawmill, which will be humming early in the summer, cutting 70,000 feet a day.

Machinery is also here awaiting shipment to Olene, twelve miles from here, where a sawmill with a daily capacity of 50,000 feet a day is to be built as quickly as possible. 12,000,000 feet of timber there awaits cutting in this plant.

In preparation for a busy season that will necessitate the running of day and night crews, the Pelican Bay Lumber Company is this winter rebuilding on a bigger scale the mill destroyed by fire last summer. The monthly payroll will be in the neighborhood of \$30,000 from this one plant.

HOUSTON'S BALL A BIG SUCCESS

The crowd of maskers at this dance was fully as large as at Houston's, and there was also a big crowd of spectators there, enjoying hugely the night's trolle.

Advertising is even now being run by the Forest Service, offering for sale 382,000,000 feet of yellow pine in the Crater Lake and Pauline National Forests. To cut this into lumber within the time limit given by the Government will mean quick construction of good capacity sawmills. On the Klamath Indian Reservation is several hundred million feet of tribal owned timber that is now in prime condition for cutting. This will have to be sold soon, to head off deterioration, and this indicates still more lumber activity and still more pay-rolls.

Another thing that is to bring more settlers to Klamath county, open of thousands of homestead tracts here. This is land that was withdrawn from settlement by the Reclamation Service some years ago. After careful investigation, it has been decided to eliminate these lands as it is impossible to irrigate them under the Klamath Project, so a lot of dry land, including some fine dry farm tracts, is to be open to filing early in January.

There will be no extensive construction work by the Reclamation Service here in 1915. The year is to be devoted to getting work already systemized, to comply with the new Reclamation law. Betterment of the water user through betterment of the operation and maintenance system will be carried on. The largest item of expenditure in 1915 in the reclamation work will be about \$75,000 in the first unit.

For themselves, the water users are planning and discussing a number of cooperative enterprises, to improve their conditions. Among these, the most talked of at present is the construction of farmer telephone lines, the farmers to own all the stock in the enterprises, and the wires to be strung so far as possible along the poles owned by the Reclamation Service. Cooperative creameries, etc., are also talked of by some of the farmers.
