NEWELL'S SUCCESSOR HIGHLY SPOKEN OF

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 5.—
The virtual dismissal of Director F.
H. Newell of the reclamation service
has been a live topic of discussion
among Westerners in congress, and
opinion is varied. There are some
who approve the course of Secretary
Lane; others who believe that New-
ell should have been retained. The-
oretically, Newell was not dismissed;
he was transferred from the position
of director to the somewhat neb-
ulous position of "consulting engi-
neer," but to those familiar with the
reclamation service, this transfer is
equivalent to dismissal, for "consult-

ing engineers" are paid only when
they are called in consultation, and
the amounts they receive annually—
most of them—would not be adequate
to keep them and their families from
starvation.

Newell, from the creation of the
reclamation service to the time of his
dismissal, has been a storm center.
He no sooner had been appointed di-
rector than a fight was started against
him by friends of Elwood Mead of
Wyoming, who had been a rival can-
didate for the directorship, and the
friends of Mead have never let up in
their fight, notwithstanding their man
never was seriously considered for

that office after it once had been
filled.

Naturally, in the administration of
a bureau like the reclamation service,
Newell has made many enemies. Set-
tlers who have experienced difficulties
with their lands and those who have
had troubles with government repre-
sentatives have blamed Newell; com-
munities that wanted projects and did
not get them blamed Newell; con-
tractors who wanted work and did not
get it blamed Newell; politicians who
tried to unload their followers on to
the reclamation service and failed
blamed Newell.

Arthur P. Davis, the new director,
has been chief engineer of the re-
clamation service since its inauguration,
and is a thoroughly competent man
for the office. In fact, no better man
could be found for the position. Davis
possesses all the engineering ability
of Newell, and in addition he has a
force and directness that Newell did
not have. It was unfortunate for
Newell that he was evasive in dis-
cussing the work of his office; there
is nothing evasive about Davis.

More than that, there is nothing
of consequence going on in the re-
clamation service that Davis does not
know about. He is an ideal man for
the job, and while he will not give
universal satisfaction—because no
one could do that—he will give as
much satisfaction as can be given,
and no man who confers with him on
reclamation matters will go away
doubtful in his mind as to what the
new director thinks, or as to what
he intends to do.

Outside of the reclamation ser-
vice, Davis probably has been rated
higher among engineers than was
Newell. It was Davis who was desig-
nated to go to Panama to confer with
the canal engineers in working out
some of their perplexing engineering
problems; it was Davis who was sent
to China to aid that government in
reorganizing its reclamation service,
and it has usually been Davis who
has been sought when others than
the government wanted the best ad-
vice on engineering problems pertain-
ing to water and the use or control of
water.

The appointment of Davis as di-
rector cannot be regarded as having
political significance, for the promo-
tion was deserved, if ever promotion
was earned in the government ser-
vice. While many men may question
the advisability of ousting Director
Newell—and there are two sides to
that question—no one who is infor-
med can question the wisdom of the
appointment of Davis as his suc-
cessor.

Confirming the fears of Western
senators, the annual estimates sub-
mitted to congress on which appropri-
ations will be made for carrying on
government reclamation work during
the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1915,
show that the amount to be available
next year will be materially less than
was available for the current year.
Secretary Lane, when he had the full
power of apportioning money for re-
clamation work, made available \$20-
000,000 for the year ending June
30th next.

The estimates submitted to con-
gress call for \$13,876,000, of which
\$4,876,000 will come from construc-

tion payments and other repayments
to the government under the law,
leaving a net appropriation to be
made by congress of only \$9,000,000.
Next year, unless congress passes a
reclamation loan bill—and this is
very doubtful—the appropriation will
be still smaller.

And at that, there is no assurance
that congress will make its appropri-
ations as liberal as the recommenda-
tions of the secretary of the interior.
Nor is there any assurance that con-
gress will distribute its appropri-
ations as suggested by the secretary of
the interior. The fear was expressed
last session, when the reclamation ex-
tension bill was under consideration,
that once the apportionment of re-
clamation funds was given to congress,
the pork barrel would be rolled to the
front, and the largest appropriations
would be made for states whose dele-
gations were most willing to "play
the game." Now we will have an op-
portunity to see whether the reclama-
tion appropriation, like river and har-
bor and public building legislation, is
to be placed on the pork barrel basis.
