POPE'S PLAN IS NEAR SUCCEEDING

ALL BUT TWO OF THE WARRING NATIONS HAVE AGREED TO EXCHANGE PRISONERS WHO ARE INCAPACITATED

ROME, Jan. 5.—It was announced today that the efforts of Pope Benedict XV, to have all crippled soldiers incapacitated for fighting, sent to their home would in all probability prove successful.

The Pontiff has been greatly encouraged. He believes that reconciliation will eventually be possible.

The Vatican announced that Germany, England, Russia, Austria, Serbia and Turkey have agreed to exchange prisoners where incapacitated and incapable to resume fighting. It is thought that France and Montenegro will also comply in this.
