INDIVIDUALIZE IT

IT WAS A HIGHLY enthusiastic gathering of men at the Hall G-ill last night, when the annual session of the Klamath Chamber of Commerce was in session, and when officers were elected for the ensuing year. The booster spirit was rampant, and the choice of officers for the year met with hearty approval. All agreed that the officers, from President Johnston down, are practical men who will sincerely devote every effort to the betterment and advancement of Klamath's interest, and many were the voluntary pledges of fealty made by those present.
One dominant argument used by Judge Webster in his splendid address, was the necessity for individual boosting, and that is what is absolutely necessary if anything is to be accomplished. For what is a town, aside from the people in it? What town will grow and prosper if it is not full of at least harmonious, if not progressive people? Real towns are not built up by people afraid to put in their best efforts for fear some other fellow will go ahead. Klamath county has wonderful opportunities, as we all know, and the Klamath Chamber of Commerce now has as live a corps of officers as the ones just retired after a year of heroic and commendable service. But more than this is needed.
This district was here at the time Columbus discovered the country, but the aforementioned Christopher did not come here. And why not? Because he knew nothing of Klamath County. Perhaps that is why sufficient farmers to till our thousands of uncultivated acres are not here—they haven't heard of Klamath Falls or Klamath County either, unless as a region torn by intestine strife or as unfavorably painted by other places.
If the Klamath Chamber of Commerce is to accomplish the work it intends to do, it requires the assistance of everybody. If the county is to come into its own, it is essential that every individual become a "booster committee of one" to work for Klamath all the time, either at home or through letter or other means in other districts, proving what Klamath has and can have, and disproving erroneous and hurtful statements and impressions.
These individual committees are to be on the job 365 days per year. Their reward will surely come with the upbuilding of the community.

Cities Protest Today on Reserve Bank Locations

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Rival claims of Richmond, Va., and Baltimore, Md., for financial and commercial supremacy were aired here today. Hearings were begun by the Federal Reserve Board upon the protest of the regional reserve bank at Richmond instead of Baltimore. Failing to win out in a fight with Richmond to have the regional bank located at Baltimore, interests of the latter city's request, as one alternative, that Baltimore be included in the Philadelphia instead of the Richmond banking district.
Other protests of geographical divisions of the new banking system were heard by the board later. The regional banks were assigned by the "organized committee" before the board was appointed. As Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo and Comptroller of Currency John Shelton Williams were members of the organization committee making the original selections and are now members of the board, it is thought that important changes in the present geographical make-up of the new system are doubtful.
Prominent bankers and business men of both Baltimore and Richmond appeared today. They filed reams of documents pro and con were the first held by the new board were the first held by the new board.
