

All Is Not Fighting Along the Trench Lines in France

German and French Soldiers, Within Hailing Distance of Each Other, Exchange Sallies---and Commodities--- But Fight Hard When Fight Is Ordered

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY AT THE FRONT, Nov. 29.—(By Mail to New York.)—At places here in the Argonne, the French and German trenches are so close together that in the weeks the two armies have been thus face to face, the soldiers are, after a fashion, personally acquainted with each other.

Here, the fighting has become systematized and follows a routine. At certain sections of the trenches the French and Germans have reached an agreement that before a certain hour in the morning there is to be no killing; in the opposing trenches the men are to be allowed to wash up and make their toilet for the day. After the gong taps, figuratively speaking any head showing above the level of the ground gets promptly taken off.

Rock battles often take place between the opposing sides. The men grow tired of having nothing to shoot at for hours at a time and in order to amuse themselves they bombard each other without the thrower exposing his person to the bullets of the enemy.

The old fashioned hand grenades have come back into style with this close trench fighting, the Germans using them frequently. They steal up to the trenches in the night or through the heavy fogs now of almost daily occurrence in this region, and let go into the midst of a crowd of men.

At times the enemies, however, become almost friendly.

"Say, over there!" a German shouted from his trench. "Have you guys got anything to smoke?"

"Sure!" the chorus came back from the French. "Have you?"

"Not a crumb!"

"Too bad. You ought to write the Kaiser."

"Gimme the makin'."

"Come and get 'em."

A giant of a young fellow stuck his head and shoulders above the ground, placed his hands on the edge of the trench and vaulted out on the side towards the French. A month-old flaxen beard stood out about a very round face. Mud covered his formerly grayish-bluish, greenish uniform. A little round, visorless fatigue cap made him look like a young Santa Claus. Stooping, he ran swiftly across the highway which separated the trenches at this point, and, falling on his stomach, peered down into the enemy's trench.

"Where's them cigars?" he demanded.

"Here they are," a Frenchman replied. "You deserve them. Six, and they're worth a louis apiece."

"Merel!" said the German as he scurried back to his burrow.

"Say," this same German shouted between puffs, "these cigars are great. Real imported hemp!"

A rock the size of a man's fist was the reply to this sally.

"Hey, you Frenchers," the German kept on, "you're a pretty decent lot. I'm going to give you a

present, too. Will you shoot me if I come over again?"

"We will that!—after what you said about the cigars."

Once more the lumbering giant catapulted out of his trench and ran low over to the French, dropping on his stomach as before. In his hand was an object, a dark green, one, with tin foil around the neck and the words "Out Americana" on a slip of paper across the sloping shoulder. It was a bottle of champagne, swiped while the Germans were in Rheims.

"Here's your health, fellow," the German said. "Drink hearty!" And back he ran.

"Hey," the Frenchmen shouted, laughing. "You've got the nerve of a burglar. You are giving us back our own champagne!"

"Oh, that's all right," the German replied. "Your cigars were made in Germany!"

Later in the day the German was killed and the news was shouted across the road. He simply would keep sticking his head above the trench during business hours. But in the night a wreath of wild flowers gathered by the Frenchmen from heaven knows where, and at no one knows what risk, fell into the trench where he was wont to have his place.

All is not cutting and slashing and shooting and gore; the spice of good humor and milk of human kindness often, in this fighting, lessens the sting of hatred between the races of which one hears so much.

Carranza Is Being Shut in by the Enemy's Army

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The troops of Generals Villa and Carranza are arraying themselves between Vera Cruz and Mexico City for what promises to be one of the most sanguinary battles ever fought on Mexican soil.

Advices today indicate that this may be the final reckoning between the two chieftains, who, until this

fall, were close friends, fighting Huertista.

Besides this battle, Carranza's troops have been called upon to defend another fierce attack much nearer Vera Cruz. In this, the attacking force is led by Zapata, the outlaw leader, now allied with Villa.

From this battle, fourteen carloads of wounded Carranzists reached Vera Cruz, the Carranzist capital yesterday. Two carloads arrived today.

Advocate a One Mill Road Levy by the State

PORTLAND, Jan. 7.—A bill providing for an extra one mill state road levy in the years 1915 and 1916 was presented to the Multnomah county delegation last night by a number of prominent taxpayers.

The fund thus raised is to aid highway development in the counties outside of Multnomah. The bill is in line with a resolution passed by the State Association of County Judges and Commissioners, at their recent session in this city.

None of the money is to be available until the first installment of taxes is returned in 1916. Although Multnomah county pays approximately one-third of the tax, it is set forth that the county is not to participate in state aid for roads. The motive for this is found in the fact that every improved highway in the state indirectly benefits Portland. The development of the state will reduce Multnomah county's proportion of the state tax charge.

War on Rabbits Is Started in Oregon

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Director H. W. Henshaw of the Biological Survey telegraphed an expert of that bureau to proceed at once to Burlington, Oregon and begin war on the jack rabbits in that locality. Congressman "Nick" Sinnott told the director a day or two ago, that something must be done quickly; that so many people had moved because of the rabbit pest there was talk of abandoning the postoffice at that place.

There are at present three experts engaged in rabbit repression in Oregon. The department finds the extermination of the rabbits over the immense areas infested by them very difficult, and one which varies in the different localities.

In Southern Idaho poisoning the pest has been very successful, especially under winter conditions and when the rabbits congregate in numbers to feed at haystacks.

This method does not seem to

work in Oregon, however because the Oregon bunnies do not seem to gather in this way. The department is at present experimenting on a large scale on several methods of poisoning and trapping, which are said to offer hope of success.

Director Henshaw assured Congressman Sinnott that the department would keep in close touch with the work at Burlington and use every effort possible to control the pest.
