American Mules Are Used by All Armies

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 7.—Twelve hundred more of America's sturdy mules are joining the armies of Great Britain weekly, according to stock yard experts today. Already for total "enlistments" of mules in this country exceed 7,000, and there is a probability that the record exports of more than 150,000 of these animals during the Boer war, will be broken if the European war is prolonged.

Inspections of mules are being held by British buyers at Kansas City, St. Louis and Nashville, Tennessee. The animals are costing the British Government nearly \$250,000 weekly. Her purchasers to date represent an expenditure of more than \$1,250,000. Great Britain has been able to raise billions of dollars in special war loans, but dealers in mules declare that her enormous expenditure for their animals prove that she considers them indispensable.

While Great Britain is the only European belligerent now buying mules for her armies, negotiations are being carried on with agents of the French and Italian governments by Missouri mule dealers, and it is probable that these countries will place contracts for mules in the near future. A lack of appreciation of the great value of mules for war purposes, dealers of Missouri say, is the reason for the failure of the French government, which is buying many thousands of cavalry horses and artillery horses weekly in the United States, to take mules.

Many mules which earned retirement on pastures long ago are being "enlisted" by the British army buyers. This due to the fact that the British contracts call for mules between the ages of six and ten years old.

As many mules fourteen to twenty years old have teeth as good as those of their ten-year-old "brothers," not of few of the animals accepted on the army contracts have already served on farms more than a decade. The old mules bring the same prices as the young animals, and as the latter are worth more in domestic markets, it is profitable, is ungrateful, to send the ten and twenty-year-olds to the battlefields of Europe.

The British army buyers require that the mules offered them stand 15.1 to 15.3 hands high, and measure 46 inches around the girth and seven inches around the skin bone. Tape

measures are used in passing on all mules submitted for the inspection of the British agents. Two inspectors of the British government have measured and accepted as many as 225 mules in a single day's work of less than eight hours.

Great Britain would have undoubtedly have purchased many more of the mules than she has already purchased for her armies but for the fact that the war department is experiencing great difficulty in obtaining transport room for the animals. The British government is now holding nearly 15,000 horses and mules at Lathrop, Missouri, and Port Chalmers, La., and other points pending the completion of shipping arrangements across the Atlantic.

The food bill for the animals held at Lathrop alone is more than \$5,000 daily.

In times of peace the shipment of mules and horses on the seas is an insignificant business, and few of the steamers are equipped to handle this traffic. As a result, it is necessary to rebuild steamers to equip them to carry mules across the ocean.

ARIZONA ALIEN LAW GETS BLOW

FEDERAL DISTRICT COURT AT SAN FRANCISCO RULES IT IS UNCONSTITUTIONAL—IS TO BE REPEALED

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7.—Arizona's law providing that at least eighty per cent of the employees on the payroll, where more than five persons were employed, must be American citizens, was today declared unconstitutional by the Federal court today. The court held that the law conflicted with the fourteenth amendment of the Federal constitution, which guarantees equal law protection to all people in this country.

Attorney-general Wiley, of Arizona has announced that he would appeal to the supreme court.

More Hay in Ration Lowers Cost of Milk

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, CORVALLIS, Jan. 7.—Hay is usually the most economical feed that can be given to dairy cows and if it is supplied in palatable form so that cows eat it more liberally, the production cost of the milk is generally lowered.

"Most dairymen use too little hay and hay of too poor quality," say the dairy experts of the Agricultural college. "The reason that more is not used is generally because hay is poorly cured so that it is dry and woody, or partly spoiled so that it has a bad flavor, and cows do not eat enough of it to balance the rations properly."

"When hay is unpalatable cows will not eat more than ten pounds each per day and this shortage must be made up by more of the expensive grains. On the other hand, good palatable hay is eaten to the amount of about twenty pounds per day, thereby giving much better results."

"Of very choice clover or alfalfa hay carefully fed with stems and poorer parts cleaned out, a 1000-pound cow may be induced to eat

as much as forty pounds per day, when given no other food. These amounts are frequently fed by farmers in irrigated sections, but it is considered better practice to feed a little grain unless the cows are not very good, or hay is quite cheap."

Hotels Would Sell Liquor With Meals

PORTLAND, Jan. 7.—If the various civic organizations will support it, an attempt will be made at the Legislature to insert in the proposed prohibition law a clause permitting hotel men to serve liquor to guests at meals. Unless they get public support, the hotel men will let the matter drop.

Officers of the various civic bodies met representatives of the hotel men yesterday to discuss the matter. The council was made to understand that if the organizations represented did not wish to cooperate, nothing further would be done. Those at the conference agreed to take the matter under advisement, and at a future

meeting to give their decision to the hotelkeepers.

The hotel men say that they do not want to operate a bar, but consider it proper to sell drinks with meals. A sandwich is not to be a meal.

This subject has been mentioned to members of the Committee of One Hundred, but it is asserted, the committee does not feel that the proposed prohibition law should be tampered with.

"If a concession is made to the hotels, then other classes of business will want to be taken care of," explained a member of the Committee of One Hundred, "and no one knows where the business would stop."
