TOO MANY BOARDS

GOVERNOR WITHYCOMBE, in his message to the Legislature today, hit the nail squarely on the head, when he urged the lawmakers to work more toward centralization of the state government and control. While the de-centralization may appear to be a success in some respects, nevertheless, it cannot be denied that the division of authority among many also makes a division of responsibility and instead of one or two persons in direct charge being held responsible, they can refer it to this or that commission, which in turn will "pass the buck" to this or that board or subdivision of board.

Another tendency of this commission craze has been to duplicate much work. While some of the commissions are perhaps necessary, there are some that are largely figurative, and they could be done away with easily, their work being taken up by other departments at very little expense.

Oregon is largely overriden by commissions and bureaus without end, which are for the most part unnecessary. And summed up, the greater part of these, instead of bringing benefit, have brought higher taxes to pay high salaried commissioners, and regulations so stringent that capitalists hesitate about making investments. These officials are supposedly the servants of the people, not arbitrary rulers, and it is believed that the present legislature will see they assume their proper places.

A LITTLE SPORTING GOSSIP

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—What has become of Willie Ritchie, is the question just now before the local sporting public. The question is especially appropriate at present with the really fine crop of lightweights now bidding for public affairs.

The White-Welsh, the Welsh-Shag-rue and the Shag-rue-White fights of recent memory and the White-Welsh affair scheduled for tomorrow night have all served to focus attention upon that class. But to date Ritchie has not been heard from.

No one thinks that the man conquered by Welsh in London is all in. Ritchie's friends have declared that his eyes are suffering as a result of that famous—or infamous battle in the English capital, but no one believes that the injury is a permanent

one. Ritchie is probably doing the sulking Achilles stunt and taking on weight at the same time. If he ever expects to get back in the ring he will have to do it soon or not at all. In the meantime he will have the hopes and the best wishes of the countless fight fans for he has always been a popular scrapper.

While on the subjects of lightweights it is worth while to notice the varying points of view in judging ten round and other short bouts. The question is, which is worth more; science or the punch?

Following the dictum laid down by "Snowy" Baker, the Australian promoter, most of the New York critics favor the scientific boxer in the short bout. This is the English system and taken into consideration the number of points piled up during a match regardless of the ruggedness of the other man.
