State Right to Fine Roads Upheld by U. S.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—In a decision handed down late yesterday by the United States supreme court, the right of state railroad commissions to fine railroads for violation of inter-state orders was sustained.

The decision was one affirming the fine of \$1,000, imposed upon the Wadley Southern, by a Georgia court, for violating a decision by the state railroad commission.

A Georgia law providing that railroads may be fined up to \$5,000 for disobeying orders of the state railroad commission was involved in the decision yesterday. The commission ordered the Wadley Southern Railroad company, a link of the Central of Georgia railway, to give shippers

of Adrian, Ga., equal privileges with those of Rockland in shipping without prepayment of freight charges.

The railroad refused to obey the order. The governor ordered a penal suit brought against the railroad and a jury ordered it fined \$1,000. The Georgia supreme court affirmed this verdict. That the penal clause of the state railroad commission act was unconstitutional was alleged by the railroad.

HOG PRICES ARE LOWERED LITTLE

BIG RECEIPTS AT UNION STOCK YARDS LAST WEEK BROUGHT DOWN FIGURES. SHEEP ARE IN DEMAND AT GOOD PRICES

PORTLAND, Jan. 12.—With the exception of Monday's run the receipts of cattle last week were slack. Prices continue on a par with Monday's market.

Best steers brought \$8.00; cows \$6.85; helpers \$6.50. The outlook is steady.

Hog receipts were particularly heavy last week, over 10,000 head coming forward.

Prices accordingly dropped some. Tops being at \$7.15 today.

All offerings in the sheep section are quickly taken. Everything available is going at good prices. Lambs bring \$7.50 while yearling wethers sell rapidly at \$6.50.

Chance for Farmers to Try Sudan Grass

(Herald Special Service)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Will sudan grass, the great new forage crop, discovered by an American in Africa in 1909, grow in Oregon? It is to be put up to farmer experimenters in Oregon to determine that.

A few packages of the seed with full directions for growing the same have been allotted by the Bureau of Plant Industry to each of Oregon's representatives in congress. These will be given out by them as long as they last to those applying for the same and promising to give same a fair trial.

Tests will be made from that spoonful of seed sent from the land of the pyramids to Texas in 1909. The stories of success read like a fairy tale.

The hay from the grass is more

abundant than that of any forage crop known. It will fit in and rotate with any crop.

Sudan grass grows faster than weeds and chokes them out. It grows well in arid land.

It is a great fattener for forage-eating animals. Best of all it is very inexpensive in cultivation.

Those enthusiastic about it claim that it is the farmer's greatest blessing. It is thought that it will grow in every part of the United States except the "far north."
