"Made in America"

Here is an American fashion created with the German cavalry uniform as the basis. It did not come from Germany and no German designer has the slightest knowledge of it, but was made in this country by American dressmakers, who recognize the tendency toward the military.

This costume of covert cloth, untrimmed but for its own cut and buttons of tan tone, will serve many purposes. Sufficiently elaborate for afternoon wear with appropriate accessories, it is also quite correct for a morning shopping tour, if worn with a tailored hat and with shoes and gloves to correspond.

A most attractive hat that will also serve many purposes is this of white faille classique, with a soft crown and a curving coronet. Tan satin flowers and leaves are laid flat against the satin and outlined with tan silk stitching. A tan veil of

figured mesh, which unfortunately shows in a solid black in the reproduction of the photograph, relieves the extreme severity of the hat and is equally smart when worn over the face of thrown back to fall over the shoulders.

It is almost superfluous to mention that the skirt is short, since at present skirts are short and particularly so in a costume that at all suggests the military, as this one does. The jacket, fitting snugly above the waistline, is fastened with a row of tan buttons, below which a peplum of circular cut falls in deep points over the hips. The collar is of tan cloth, matched by a tiny bit of tan on the cuffs, above which tabs of the covert cloth are buttoned into place.

Quaint Queries

(While the Herald makes no pretense to run an "Answer to Correspondence" department, we have a friend who every once in awhile asks for information that is little out of the ordinary, and it is necessary to dig into the archives at our disposal to gain the required information. The thought suggested itself that we give the result to all Herald readers.)

The last question of this kind was: "What was the origin of the term 'Dixie' as applied to the southern states?"

The following definition is given in the Americana:

"DIXIE—A name associated in negro minstrelsy with the Southern states. It is supposed to be derived from the name of one Dixie, a large holding and kindhearted slave owner on Manhattan Island, New York, in the latter part of the 18th century.

"His treatment of his negroes caused them to regard his plantation (or Dixie's) as little short of an earthly paradise, and when any of the slaves were taken away from home they always pined for 'Dixie's' while singing and talking of its joys.

"When slavery moved southward, in search of more secure and congenial habitat, the same ideal of 'Dixie' was taken along, and the chant which the former slaves of Dixie sang of their old home became so widespread that its origin was lost sight of, and it came to be applied to the southern homes of the negroes.

"In fact, in the South, 'Dixie' is held to mean the Southern states, the word being regarded as a derivation and corruption of 'Mason and Dixon's Line,' which originally divided the free and slave states. It is supposed by some of the Southerners to have first come into use when Texas joined the Union, and the negroes frequently sang of it as 'Dixie'."

A LITTLE SPORTING GOSSIP

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—Followers and supporters of the boxing game in New York are viewing with some trepidation the attitude of the new governor, Charles S. Whitman and his administration, toward the Frawley bill, which has legalized the ten-round no-decision bouts here for a long time. Persistent rumors in the sporting circles are to the effect that the new administration is contemplating revolutionary measures, chief among which is the abolition of the one-man system.

Governor Whitman, it is known has favorably commended on the proposition of putting the game in the hands of one man. Under the Frawley bill, the present commission consists of three men, and there has been some dissatisfaction over the matter in which the sport is conducted.

Supporters of the present commission are pointing out to new officials the recent report of the commission's secretary, Charles Harvey, in which it was set forth the state obtained a revenue of almost \$332,000 from the game past year. It is also pointed out the commission has forced to take action against clubs for putting up fake and sham battles.

However, there is dissatisfaction over the state of "grand old game" here. Those not in sympathy with the commission have laid charges of favoritism at its door. These charges set out that the commission has favored certain clubs with attractive shows, while putting obstacles in the paths of others. The up-state legislative element, it is understood, is the most strongly opposed to the manner in which the sport in being conducted now. It is also whispered

this same element is favoring the abolition of the game entirely.

Just what will be the outcome of the controversy is being guessed at freely, but nothing definite is known. In the meantime, both elements are resting on their guns with some trepidation.

As the time draws near for the ball clubs to start southward in search of condition, the champion Braves are looming up large as probable pennant winners again in the eyes of the Gotham fans. The recent acquisition of Sherwood Magee, the slugging outfielder, has given a decided boost to a team that was considered a poor batting aggregation last year. Also, it is pointed out, Magee last year was dissatisfied at Philadelphia and did not perform in his best style, notwithstanding the fact his name is very high among the National league sluggers. The records give Magee credit for driving in the most runs last year. This in view of a pitching staff which is par excellence, is making the Braves loom up a big obstacle in the path of John McGraw and his Giant crew.

Pessimists in the sport game can now take their hammers and beat it to the cyclone cellar. Those who complain that interest in sporting events in on the wane can sneak a look at the records for the late 1914 in which it is shown 25,000,000 persons pushed their cash through the box office windows to view the sporting events. This figure represents about one-fourth of the population of the United States. Baseball, of course, leads with approximately 9,000,000. Football comes next with over 8,000,000 and the rest is divided up in boxing, tennis golf, amateur athletic meets and various other forms of athletics.
