HELP HOME PRODUCERS

(Eugene Register)

THE CITIES of Oregon are to be highly criticized for their failure to investigate the merits of wood paving. Lumbering is Oregon's greatest manufacturing industry, but now and for several years past the lumber business has been facing a depressed market. One of the reasons for this market depression is the rapid increase in substitutes for lumber, such as cement and steel. Asphalt may also be regarded as a substitute for lumber, as it enters into competition with it in the construction of pavement. Of course, it would be foolish to maintain that the substitution of wood block paving for asphalt would put the lumber industry back on its feet, but it would certainly help.

Wood block paving is something like the proverbial dog in that the bad name that was given to it when it first came into use has clung. But the wood block paving that was used a few years ago was so poorly constructed that it could not be expected to stand up under traffic. It was laid on a foundation of sand, and the result was exactly the same as when any other kind of roadway is laid on a poor foundation. It settled unevenly, holes formed and held water, and the surface soon went to pieces.

Construction methods have been nearly improved since that time, however. Specially treated blocks are now laid on a concrete foundation, and the defects due to settling are avoided. The pavement is even less noisy than asphalt, and it is easily and cheaply repaired by taking out the worn blocks and replacing them with new. Wood block paving is about as expensive to build as asphalt, but it certainly could be laid for the price that Eugene has been paying for the last year or two.

There has been considerable agitation recently in regard to the use of Oregon stone in the public buildings of the state. If it is desirable to use Oregon stone in public buildings it is equally desirable to use Oregon material for pavement that is built and paid for by the public.

SOME MINOR WAR NEWS FROM EUROPE

LITTLE STORIES FROM THE FRONT THAT ARE COMING IN THROUGH THE CAPITALS OF THE NATIONS NOW FIGHTING EACH OTHER—SOME ARE TRIVIAL, BUT ALL ARE INTERESTING AT THIS TIME.

LONDON, Dec. 23.—(By mail to New York.)—"We are learning to make all sorts of fancy dishes that would make a first class menu for any hotel," writes Corporal T. Harper, of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, in a cheery letter home.

"Have you ever tried Jack Johnson soup? This is how you make it. You get the usual stuff in the pot, and set it on to boil just within range of the German guns. By and by a 'Jack Johnson' shell comes along and drops into your soup, serving out the contents very liberally among all who happen to be near enough whether they said they were going to skip the soup course or not.

"All this makes meal times much more exciting and entertaining than at home, so you will have to start an association for brightening up meal times unless you want us to be terribly bored when we get back."

PARIS, Dec. 23.—(By mail to New York.)—"Although I have had

a rough time in the past, this campaign beats all," writes a French soldier to friends.

"My hair has gone almost white in two months. I have not slept in a bed for 112 days, nor undressed ten times in all—always on the move, night and day. For as many as three days and two nights I have been without a meal or sleep.

In a letter to the Spectator, Lieutenant-general Tyrrell points out that for the protection of the Suez canal and Egypt, the correct strategy for Great Britain would involve the occupation of Jaffa, Jerusalem and Acre, and the cutting of the Hejaz railway line. In this event, he observes, a battle would be fought on the very site of Har-Megiddo, or Armageddon.
