

OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"The Christian in Klamath Falls"

The union meetings during the past two weeks have been well attended, and the interest has been good.

The success or failure of these meetings will be determined by the attitude of the Christian people toward them. There can be no successful forward movement in any community, except as the movement starts in the hearts of the Christian men and women of that community.

The exodus of the children of Israel, from Egyptian bondage, was one of the greatest religious movements this world has ever known, but that movement started in the heart of Moses, the man who was most deeply concerned about the welfare of the people.

When Jesus spoke to his disciples about preaching the gospel to the whole world, he told them that they should begin at Jerusalem. The beginning had to start right in the heart of the country, where he had told and died.

The Pentecostal meeting was the first great Christian revival, but it began in the hearts of one hundred and twenty disciples, who were already the followers of Christ, nor did the influence of the meeting reach those on the outside until the hundred and twenty disciples had been filled with the spirit of the Lord. We can not expect any meeting here in Klamath Falls to reach the people outside of the church, until the people of the church have been filled with the spirit of the Lord.

Dr. F. B. Meyer said the Lord could not use an unclean vessel, and

this is certainly true. The Lord does not require for his service, golden vessels, nor silver vessels, nor brass vessels, but he does require clean vessels. He can use an earthen vessel to his honor, if it is only clean. Neither does the Lord require in his service brilliant people, or cultured people, or wealthy people, but he does require clean people. The cleansing of the soul for service is a constant process. I mean it, "must be cleansed over and over again and again."

If you take the most beautiful vessel and wash it clean and set it aside in the room for a few days, you will find it covered with small particles of dirt, so until it has been cleansed again, it is unfit for use to the person, who must have clean vessels. So the Christian soul, which has come in contact with selfishness, envy or hatred needs cleansing again before it is fit for the Lord's service.

The Christian people of Klamath Falls, are the Lord's witnesses here. We know that our Lord's case seems to be going against him, surely the fault is with his witnesses.

Two weeks ago in our Sunday school lesson, we learned that the children of Israel did right as long as Joshua and the elders lived, but after they died, then the Israelites turned away from God. Perhaps it was because after the elders died, there was no witness left who knew anything about the Lord, except what he had heard, and hear-say evidence is worth but little. The weight of the witness' testimony also depends upon the life he lives in the community.

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—George Stallings is going to need a few of his miracles next season if he romps home with his second National League pennant. Jawn J. McGraw will have something to say where the flag is going to float unless the signs are wrong.

McGraw awakened to the fact some weeks ago that his Giant crew was woefully lacking in spots. So Jawn loaded up his purse and went to market. He came back with one of the best, if not the best, third sacker in the old league, J. Honus Lobert, who has cavorted around the three-quarter stop for the Phillies since 1911. That hole is securely plugged.

And in plugging the cavity, Jawn J. also got rid of some dead wood—if not dead, then slightly plithy. This excess consisted of Al Demaree. Demaree had an excellent year in 1913 despite bad health. McGraw picked his games for him and the tall cartoonist came through with

flying colors. Last season he fell down badly and Gotham fans hold him and Marquard's failure, greatly responsible for the pennant going to Boston. Stock, the second man in the trade for Lobert, did his best to fill Tillie Schaefer's shoes, but the result was anything but satisfactory to McGraw. Adams, a young catcher, goes to the Philadelphia club without a trial to McGraw. He was snared in the draft at the close of the 1914 season.

The Giant infield before the departure of Schaefer and Herzog was considered one of the best in the business. Lobert, unless all the dope is wrong, will fill Herzog's shoes admirably and a hole through which many games dribbled away last season will be plugged.

However, a great deal of the Giant's hopes lay with the hurlers, particularly whether Mathewson runs true to form. If he does, and Marquard's case is settled in favor of the Giants, McGraw is going to present a formidable array of pitching strength, backed up by Jeff Teague and several promising recruits.

DISCRIMINATION AGAINST
WOMEN TO BE STOPPED

SALEM, Jan. 16.—School boards will be prohibited from paying a female teacher a less salary than a male teacher for the same work, if a bill introduced by Representative Allen, of Marion county, becomes a law. In addition to performing the same work, a female teacher must also have had the same length of experience according to the provisions of the measure. The bill was introduced because in many districts now female teachers are performing the same work as male teachers at a lower salary.
