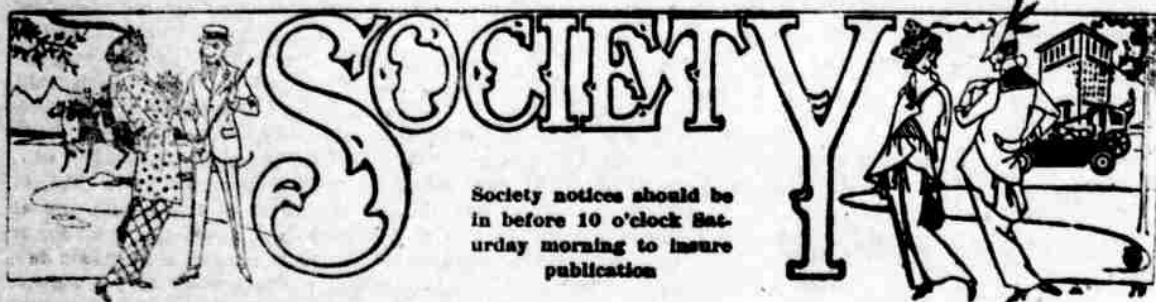

Kitchener Hot After Grafters



Lord Kitchener is a firm believer in Wellington's old doctrine, "When things are getting mixed up, hang a contractor." As a result there have been less graft and jobbery during the present war than there was in the South African war.

"K. or K." has allowed it to be plainly known that any contractor who plays the country false during his administration will hang, and it is reliably reported that one wealthy money grabber's fate is in the balance. The crookedness discovered has not been so serious as might have been the case under another war secretary, but Kitchener thinks it would be a fine time to make an example, as he holds that tampering with clothing, supplies, ammunition, etc., for the troops, the blackest kind of treason.

King George supports Kitchener in this, but a couple of soft-hearted cabinet ministers are urging that the culprit's crime is not sufficiently serious to justify the extreme penalty.

Imported Eggs Get Attention in House

SALEM, Jan. 16.—Three bills striking at imported eggs were introduced in the House by Representative Allen, of Marion county. The first provides that all eggs imported and sold in the state shall be marked "imported"; the second that all food products in packages in which eggs are an ingredient shall be marked "imported eggs used"; the third provides that drink dispensers who use imported eggs in any drink they sell must have a sign posted in their establishment advising the public of the fact.
