Let One City Official Purchase All Supplies

(Herald Special Service)

EUGENE, Jan. 18.—"Some one person should be responsible for the purchase of all supplies for Oregon cities," says Professor Don C. Sowers, director of the municipal research bureau of the University of Oregon. "In a small city this can best be accomplished by making it one of the duties of the city recorder. In a large city, or in a county, a separate position of purchasing agent might have to be created."

This is one piece of advice given in Professor Sowers' third bulletin entitled "Short Talks for Busy Officials," which is being sent to officials of any Oregon city requesting it. As things now are in Oregon cities Professor Sowers says:

"A comparatively large number of men is granted the privilege of purchasing supplies, materials and serv-

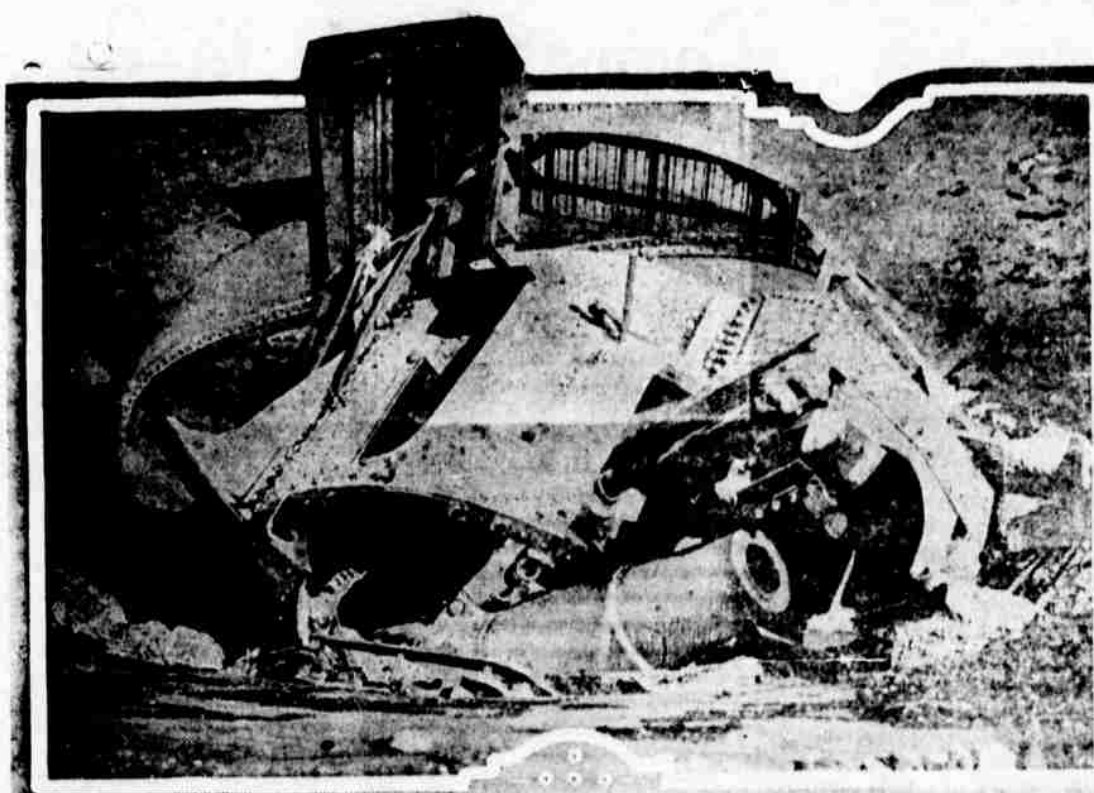
ices. In most of the small cities, the following officials do their own purchasing: Recorder, treasurer, engineer, chief of police, chief of fire department, street commissioner and superintendent of parks. Whether the purchasing is done directly by heads of departments or by council committees, we have six or eight groups making purchases payable out of city funds.

"The result is what might be expected: there is no competition among local dealers. Each city official or council committee buys from his favorite dealers on the dealers' own terms.

"This course is not followed in any well organized department store."

A model ordinance for organization of the office of purchasing agent accompanies the bulletins.

Quaint Queries

The answer to the latest query from the inquisitive friend, as to the meaning of the signal used by wireless operators in time of danger on the seas, can best be answered by reprinting the following from an exchange:

What S. O. S. Means

In talking with the wireless operator, many ship passengers ask the meaning of the three letters used in the distress signal, "S. O. S." There seems to be a general opinion that the letters are the abbreviation of three separate words with a definite

meaning. Persons of an imaginative trend will tell you that the letters stand for "save our ship," "Send out succor," "Sink or swim" or some such meaning. The letters signify nothing but that a ship is in distress and in need of assistance. The call is used by all nations as a universal code, so that any wireless operator, regardless of the language he speaks, can immediately intercept the call of distress. Inasmuch as the call is in use by all countries, it can be seen that the signal can have no meaning in any language. The character of

the code makes it a call that can be picked out easily from other signals, being composed of three dots, three dashes, three dots.
