WANTED: A MARKET

"WHAT Klamath needs is more farmers," has long been one of our slogans. We have been wont to shout about our thousands of acres needing only some industrious man to convert them from raw land into wealth producing tracts, raising crops of enormous value and bountiful yield.

For years we have been on the lookout for more farmers. For two years, at least, we have been working to bring dairymen here, telling of the good income from feeding alfalfa to dairy stock, selling the cream to the creamery and raising hogs on the skimmed milk.

But now that the dairying industry is getting a nice start here, it is about time something was done to take care of the farmer's products. He is now producing—but he needs a proper market.

There has been instance after instance this winter where farmers, after their trouble of raising porkers, killed and butchered them, and brought them to Klamath Falls for disposal—only to find there was no demand at all at that time in the markets. It was then either up to the farmer to sell the pork at less than half its value, to try to sell it through the residence district, or to haul the meat back home, out his time in addition to the rest.

This is not the entire order of thing, of course, but it has happened to several farmers. It can hardly be called an encouragement to the farmers.

Something is wrong, apparently, and it is a matter that the Chamber of Commerce could take up with profit. Such a move, above all others would tend to convince the farmers that the Chamber of Commerce is unselfishly working for the good of the whole community.

Feeling that perhaps a market report, giving once or twice a week the condition of the local market, and the prices paid for butter, eggs, poultry and other farm produce might be a help to the farmer in advantageous marketing, the Herald has decided to begin the publication of such a report. In addition to local produce prices, livestock prices in other cities will be quoted for the guidance of our stock men.

We will heartily welcome any suggestion regarding this feature from any of our readers.
