Japanese Nurses, Physicians and Interpreter Pass Through United States on Way to War

Seventeen Japanese nurses, with two physicians, an interpreter and a business manager, have passed through the United States on their way to the war in Europe. They were hailed with enthusiasm all along the route from San Francisco to New York. They expect to be engaged in work near Southampton, England, but may go to the Continent later. Miss Yamamoto one of the head nurses in charge, is superintendent of a large charity hospital in Tokio; Miss Shize Kiyooka is the other.

Nursing has come to be quite a popular profession for women in Japan, according to Miss Yamamoto. Of course, it is a great innovation, but as the women of highest rank have taken it up they have set the seal of respectability upon it for all classes. The organization of Red Cross nurses is part of Japan's military system, and is directly under government supervision. No caste is recognized in the training schools, to which young Japanese women who have passed the requisite examinations are admitted; merit reigns supreme. And the decorations bestowed for excellent services are a guarantee of a pension when the years of active duty—fifteen or so—are over. Each medal means a certain amount of money given by the government annually.

"Soon after the war broke out," Miss Yamamoto said, "Russia sent us for Red Cross nurses. Then England and France did also, and we are very glad to go."
