

"Solid South" Wants Uncle Sam to Develop a Power Site

Senator Underwood et al. Would Have \$150,000 in Rivers and Harbors Bill for the Generation of Power to Turn Wheels of Enterprise

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—If you know of Niagara Falls, you are acquainted with the fact that its giant power houses can take out 450,000 horsepower from the millions of gallons of water. But you perhaps have never heard of Mussel Shoals in the Tennessee river. Here is a mighty project, from which its backers propose to develop 680,000 horsepower; more than Niagara, more than the combined horsepower of the large manufacturing cities of Holyoke, Manchester, Lawrence, Lowell and Cohoes.

And this dream—a dream a substantial backing—is what Majority Leader Underwood of Alabama, has proposed to President Wilson for his inspection and careful consideration. This year, \$150,000 is asked in the rivers and harbors bill for initial work of developing this gigantic power. Later, thousands of more dollars will be spent if the dream of the dreamers comes true. The government is asked to loan a large amount to a hydro-electric concern to build this power. Its money that would be cast on the waters—but to return after many years in full to the treasury.

The significant feature of the plan as it presented to President Wilson by Underwood, was the manufacture of cyanamid at the Shoals. Now, cyanamid is neither a breakfast food or a new German explosive. On the other hand, it is one of the most valuable fertilizers that this nation knows. Yet, strange to say, this nation must depend on Europe chiefly for its supply.

Cyanamid is almost dirt cheap, if one has the facility to make it. In fact, its chief ingredient comes out of the air.

Nitrogen—the most valuable of all fertilizers is contained in large quantities in air. A charge of electricity will draw it out, so to speak. The rest of the cyanamid is merely an admixture of lime.

Still, year in and year out this country is paying millions for Chile's nitrates for fertilizers, when they might come out of the air.

The Mussel Shoals project backers propose to manufacture this product extensively, thus furnishing a valuable supply for revitalizing tired farm lands, and saving this nation the bill Europe and Chile now annually hold against us.

Still another idea of the Mussel

Shoals dreamers is to utilize the "bauxite" of the southland to manufacture aluminum. At present this ore goes to Niagara Falls for conversion into the light-weight, yet durable metal. If President Wilson and congress approve the plan, this shoal will be converted into an enormous manufacturing plant, with its raw products in the air and the ground right at hand.

Furthermore, the south's iron and steel business, the shoal's backers say, will be boomed by the use of hydro-electric power for huge furnaces.

Discussing the subject today Representative Underwood declared that the proposal would be one of the biggest industrial booms the south could have. He scoffed at contentions of Representative Fear, of Wisconsin, that the proposal of appropriation would mean a gift on a silver platter to the electric companies. Fear's contention that the shoals are deteriorating from a navigation standpoint was admitted by Underwood, but he argued that the government ought to lend its aid to a proposal that meant as much as this to the south as to the farming industry throughout the land.

West's Spite Bill Comes Up in Salem

SALEM, Jan. 26.—Patterned largely after the "George Bill," defeated at the last general election, and the initiation of which was prompted by ex-Governor West, a bill was introduced in the House by Representative Thomas, of Marion county, providing for the abolition of the State Water Board, Desert Land Board, the offices of the two water superintendents, and the State Engineer and for the substitution thereof of a Director of Public Works.

Revengeful politics on the part of ex-Governor West prompted the initiation of the "George Bill" at the general election, a feud existing between the ex-governor and the State Engineer. Common report has it that the fine Italian hand of the ex-governor is back of the bill introduced in the House.

Briefly the measure provides that for the office which the bill seeks to abolish there shall be appointed a director of works, who shall be appointed by the governor at a salary of \$3,000 a year, and that he shall provide a \$10,000 bond.

Provision is made that he shall perform the work now performed by the state engineer, two water superintendents, the State Water Board, which is composed of two, the Desert

Land Board, composed of the governor, secretary of state, attorney-general and treasurer, and given him power to appoint all necessary assistants.

It further provides for an advisory board to consist of the governor, attorney-general, and director of public works, and carries an appropriation of \$60,000.

Irrigation organizations, commercial clubs and practically everybody interested in irrigation and the reclamation of the state's road lands opposed the "George Bill," and it is expected that its introduction will bring to the capitol a large lobby to defeat it.

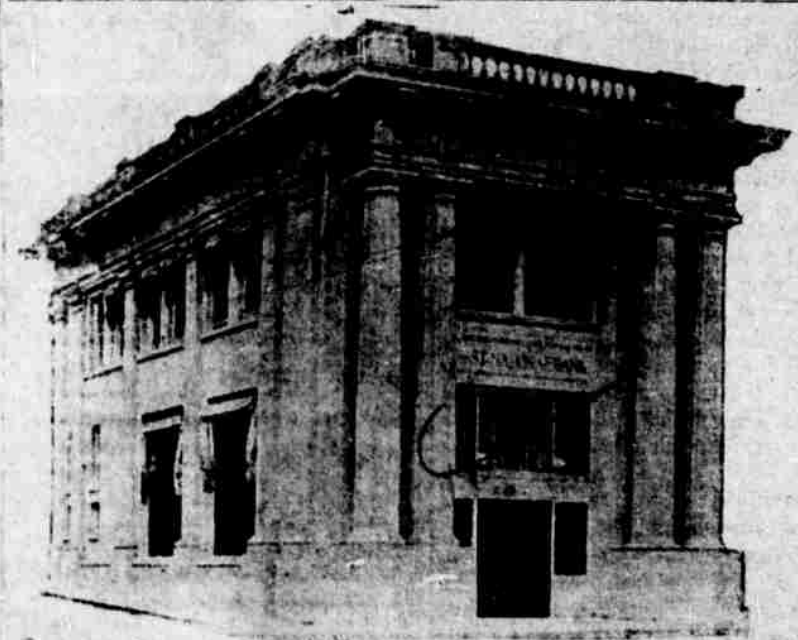
The former governor, in addition to his activities as a lumberman and politician, has been interested in agriculture for a great many years.
