Measure Is to Regulate the Employment Agents

SALEM, Jan. 20.—Stringent regulations for employment agents and employers of labor are provided in a bill introduced in the House by Representative Lewis, of Multnomah county. Before any employment agent can engage in business under this bill he must obtain a license from the labor commissioner and furnish a \$1,000 bond, the bill provides.

Provision is also made that the agent shall be both criminally and civilly liable for furnishing incorrect information as to employment.

The criminal penalty provided is a misdemeanor, and the civil liability the recovery of the fee and transportation.

Furthermore, it is provided that it shall be unlawful for an employer to refuse to accept labor from an employment agent, after ordering it, and that if he does he shall be civilly liable to the agent. It is also made a misdemeanor for the agent and employer to divide the fee obtained by the former for furnishing employment or information leading thereto.

Marshall P. Wilder, Humorist, Is Dead



Marshall P. Wilder, who for two generations has been one of the famous entertainers of the country, died suddenly at St. Paul the other day. He was born in Geneva, N. Y., September 19, 1859. Because of his physical disability—he was a dwarf so far as height was concerned—his education was limited to a few terms in the public schools. He took naturally to mimicry and was the fun-maker of his class.

At the age of twelve Mr. Wilder gave a Punch and Judy show in his father's back yard and charged two cents general admission, five cents for reserved seats. It is said by those who still remember young Wilder's remarkable show that there was never any empty seat.

"I asked King George the Five Times, through the press agent in charge of the bon mot department, if the job of king's jester was still open," Mr. Wilder once said in speaking of a visit to the court of St. James. "He answered that it had been abolished by one of his royal predecessors. I thereupon expressed my regret, saying that I had hoped I might be able to spar for an opening there, having a fine job lot of jests not any more ancient than those used by their distinguished majesties."

MINIATURE OIL WELL ATTRACTS

KERN AND TULARE COUNTIES HAVE WORKING MODEL AT SAN DIEGO EXPOSITION WHICH DRAWS THOUSANDS

SAN DIEGO, Jan. 20.—To visitors from eastern states who come to this city to see the Panama-California Exposition, which opened here New Year's eve, one of the most attractive displays is a miniature oil well in actual operation in the building occupied by Kern and Tulare counties, California. The standard pump found on oil fields throughout California, stands seventy-five feet high. The miniature pump is twelve feet high, and stringer for stringer and bolt for bolt is an exact replica of the full-sized pump. The miniature, which is operated by an electric motor, pumps the crude oil from a reservoir underground into a large vat. The mouth of the pump is some distance above the vat, but the heavy liquid pours into the pool below with a big splash.

VISTULA AGAIN SCENE OF FUSS

RUSSIAN MOVEMENT TOWARD PRUSSIA IS BEING COMBATTED BY A GERMAN OFFENSIVE ALONG THE RIVER

United Press Service PETROGRAD, Jan. 20.—Owing to another threatened invasion of east Prussia, the German forces are renewing attempts to cross the Vistula and attack the rear of the Russian army.

Late reports say the Russian lines have advanced twenty miles nearer the east Prussian border. The army is now twenty-five miles northwest of Plock.

How Silver Is Arranged at a Big Dinner Party

In the home problem department not include the silver for dessert, of the February Woman's Home Companion, a subscriber asks for a description of the proper way to place, soup spoons, fruit spoons, butter plates, for a dinner of soup, meat, salad, dessert and coffee, the dinner. The editor of the department answers the question as follows:

The accepted way of arranging silver at each cover is to place the forks at the left of the plate in the order in which they are to be used and the knives and spoons at the right in the same order. This does not include the silver for dessert, which is brought in with the dessert. Bread and butter spreaders are frequently laid on the bread and butter plates. For a dinner of soup, meat, salad, dessert and coffee, the silver is arranged thus: at the left of the plate the fork for meat on the outside and the salad fork next at the right of the plate, the meat knife next to the plate and the soup spoon next to it on the outside. Bouillon spoons are used for soup and the knives and spoons at the right in the same order. This does not include the silver for dessert, which is brought in with the dessert.

The thousands of young lives offered up on the battlefield must know that their sacrifice and that of their nearest and dearest has not been in vain. Filled with the deepest human sympathy we must give of that which is divine within us, the love which is ready for all sacrifice, even unto life itself."
