SHUT THE DOORS

WHILE THE LEGISLATURE is in session, might it not be a good idea for someone to introduce a bill prohibiting spectators from court rooms during the trial of such cases as the Jonas trial, which has packed the circuit court room yesterday and today. Certainly nothing elevating to the mind can be gained from listening to testimony of such a morbid character.

Such regrettable affairs as these cases grow out of bringing nothing but shame and humiliation upon both accuser and accused, and upon their families. Is it right that their humiliation—possibly disgrace—should be paraded before a throng of people whose only interest in the affair is morbid curiosity, or an appetite for sensuous, sordid things.

In the interests of humanity, such cases must be tried; justice must be accorded the wronged party, whether it be the man or the woman in the case. And in order to deal with the case fairly and impartially, it is essential that all of the facts must be given, no matter how indelicate they may be.

For a young girl to take the witness stand, and under oath, tell the court and jury the story of outraged or lost chastity is an ordeal. But for her to have to relate these circumstances with hundreds of eager eyes staring intently at her as she lays bare her soul, with hundreds of ears waiting to catch any statement that might smack of the vulgar, or be perverted into it to afford salacious delectation at the time, or ribald laughter later when repainted and related to others, the thought of such a terrible experience is enough to cause her to bear her shame alone and become an outcast from home and friends, forced into a life that is eternal hell and remorse while living—because she loved "not wisely but too well."

Our courts are maintained for serving the interests of justice, not for the entertainment of the morbid.
