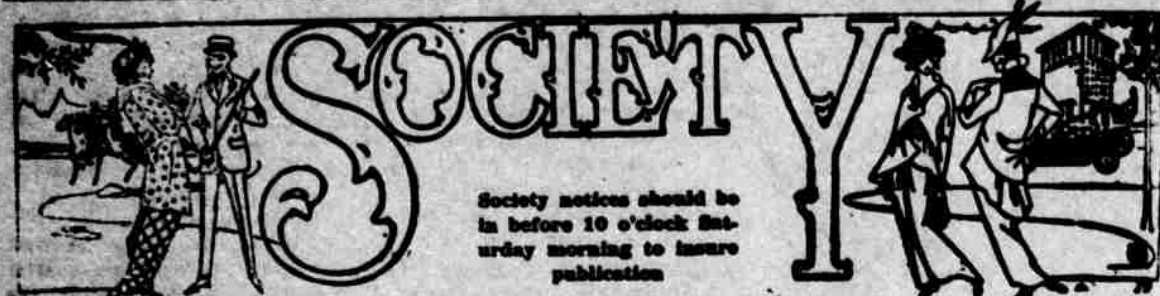

A LITTLE SPORTING GOSSIP

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—Without a doubt the game of golf is gaining converts, perhaps more rapidly than any other sport. Once looked upon as distinctly the sport of the men of some age and avocation, it now reaches into all ages and types of men for its followers.

Wide press agenting, one golf expert declares, is responsible for the advance in golfing. Word that sturdy athletics like Christy Mathewson and other ball players had taken to chasing the little white ball across the green, brought many followers to the game. They even report here that John J. McGraw of the Giants, is about to take up the pastime of John D. Rockefeller and other notables. The report, however, seems to be based on nothing more tangible than the fact that "Jawn" was presented

with a fine assortment of golf clubs. The army of fanatics who play the game in this country was increased last year by more than 50,000, according to representatives of golf supply houses. At the recent meeting of the United States Golf Association, gain in membership of 33 golf clubs with members running into the thousands, was reported over the previous year.

The growth of municipal golf courses has brought out regiments of new golf enthusiasts in larger cities of the country. There is every reason to believe that the coming season will see a great host of recruits to the game.

Water Systems for Rural Communities

SALEM, Jan. 23.—Communities are authorized to incorporate like municipal corporations for the purpose of supplying their inhabitants with water for domestic purposes in a bill, introduced today by Representative Risley. To incorporate they must petition the county court, and if the petition has fifteen per cent of the legal voters of the district prescribed in the petition, the court shall call a special election for the purpose of giving the people in the district an opportunity to vote on the question. Should the vote be in favor of incorporation, then trustees are to be elected.
