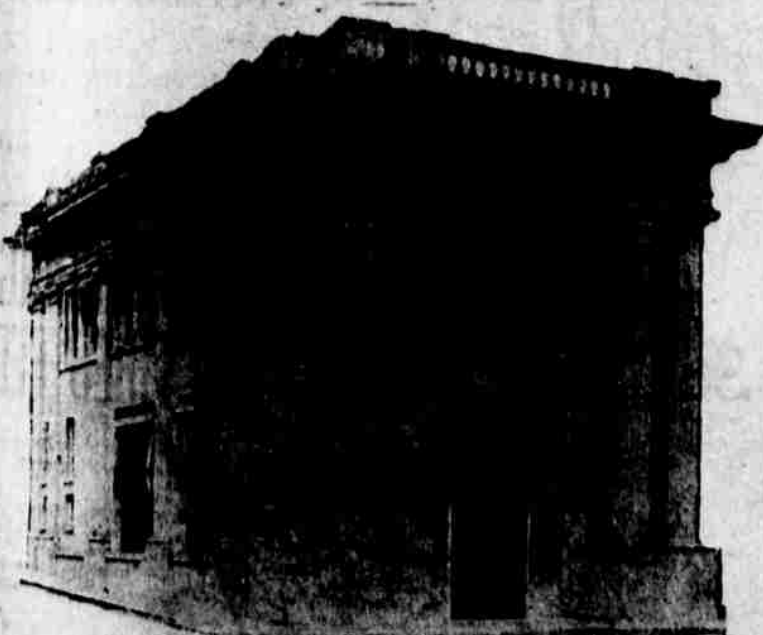

on the Panama-Pacific International
Exposition's exhibit buildings is now
completed. The last building to be
finished was the steel-framed fire
proof Palace of Fine Arts.
This building in the form of an
arc, 1,100 feet in length. It is sit-
uated on a large lagoon immediately
west of the main group of palaces,
and it is regarded as the handsomest
building on the grounds. It cost
about \$500,000.
