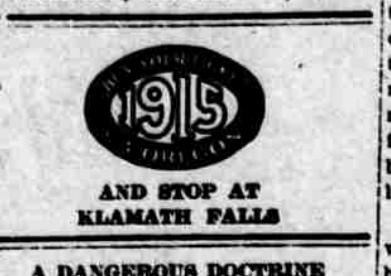

VOTE ON RUM IN 1916 IN CALIF.

MEETING OF DRY FORCES WILL GATHER IN FRESNO NEXT MONTH, WHEN THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT WILL BE FRAMED

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 26.—California will vote again on November 7, 1916, on a proposed constitutional amendment that would banish the sale of liquor, manufacture and the consumption from California. Prohibition forces are undismayed by their defeat at the state election, and believe that they will be victorious two years hence.

Every section of the state, and practically all of its prohibition interests will be represented at a conference at Fresno, February 25, at which the proposed amendment will be framed. Lieutenant Governor A. J. Wallace is the chairman of a committee in charge of the conference.

Upon signing up 5,000 acres suitable soil in the Rogue river valley, C. W. Nibbey will establish a beet sugar factory at Medford.

Furniture Bill Vetoed

Equipping of City Hall Has Been Further Delayed

the determination of these gentlemen to perpetrate the practice of transacting the business of the council as they see fit, regardless of the rights or feelings of any who fails to do their bidding, and then have the mayor come along and make his mark, or 'sign here,' like a good little fellow, or pay the price of being branded an obstructionist by the public.

"The mayor is supposed to know when the council meetings are to be held and either the mayor or president of the council must preside over the meetings. Section 33, of the charter, provides that meetings of the council must be public, and requires a journal of its proceedings to be kept. There is, therefore, no good reason why the duties of the police judge and the mayor should become mixed."

The mayor also read again the statement signed by Councilmen Lockwood and Owens, first submitted when the bids were opened, that the meeting on Thanksgiving day was not a regular meeting of the council, and that there was no authorization made for the advertising of bids.

In the protest, the mayor also held that another point of illegality was the fact that the ordinance he was asked to sign contracted for in excess of \$1,000, and that the charter provided that any such expenditure should be submitted to the voters at a special election for their approval or rejection.

"Now I am sorry that I cannot sign the contract and ordinance," said the statement in conclusion, "but the fault is not mine, and if those who are responsible for it can close the contract without me, I will be more than pleased to have Mr. Virgil get it, but if I am to be personally humiliated and forfeit my self-respect, the price is greater than I can pay."

Rogers held that the mayor was working to make matters still worse for the council.

"Instead of working with the council, and getting us straight on the matter when he saw we were wrong, the mayor is fighting us to the last minute," said he. "There isn't a man on the council who would not work with him if he would work with us. It seems pretty late to have this matter brought up in such a shape at this time, after we wrangled for

two hours about it when the bids were opened."

"I brought the matter up the night the bids were opened, as you all know," retorted Nicholas. "There isn't a man on the council against whom I have anything personal, and I'm willing to work with them. When I can't get along with the council, my days of usefulness to the city are over. But I don't believe that it is my duty to follow the council around and put them straight on matters transacted at an illegal meeting."

The mayor informed the council a couple of times that the measure could become a law by passing it over his veto. To do this, a four-fifths vote was necessary.

In this, Rogers evidently smelled further trouble, if the measure should be adopted over the veto. At any rate he spoke thusly:

"The council didn't try to pass the Ankeny canal election ordinance over your veto, why should we try it in this case?"

"There is a difference between the two measures," replied the mayor. "It was very hard for me to veto this, but I consider it to be my duty. But I can say I am proud of having vetoed the Ankeny ditch. No matter which way I act, I am bound to be censured, and I intend to do my duty."

Another matter that called for some further debate was the mayor's statement that the money for the furniture was in excess of what could be voted by the council. The councilmen held that the people authorized them to spend this money when they voted the \$50,000 city hall bond issue, as the money used for furniture is out of that fund.

And so the matter dropped.

RIGHT TO COAST GIVEN TO PUBLIC

AFTER SOME DEBATE, COUNCIL VOTED TO ALLOW THE USE OF THIRD STREET FOR THE WINTER PASTIME

After several minutes of discussion in which R. C. Spink, Harold Kinnear, J. W. Linquist and Mayor Nicholas were the principal speakers, the council last night granted the request of a numerous signed petition, asking that coasting be allowed on Third street, week nights from 7 to 11 o'clock.

Rogers moved for the granting of the petition, Matthews and Lockwood voted with him, Owens and Hamilton opposing.

Mr. Spink held that Third street owners, who paid for the improvement, did not sign the petition, as they are against this. He held that the coasting was dangerous, and makes the street of little use for its original purpose.

Messrs. Kinnear and Linquist spoke in favor of the petition, holding that there is too little pastime for the youngsters. Linquist held that the coasting is beneficial to the young peoples' health. After an argument between Linquist and the mayor, the petition was granted, and about fifty youths started a jubilant exodus from the city hall.

Hatchery Site Leased
J. D. Venator has just received notice from the State Fish Commission advising him that the lease had been signed for his property in the mouth of Crane Creek canyon on which a fish hatchery would be established. The lease is for a term of five years.—Lake Co. Examiner.

Naughty, Naughty Medford
The Medford Drama league has been criticised for not securing Henry Miller, Forbes Robertson and David Warfield this season. True, these eminent artists have played on the coast and passed through the city, but there is only one thing that can get them here, and that is money. Muzzled Dogs
As a precaution against the epidemic of rabies now prevalent in Central Oregon all unmuzzled dogs at large on the streets of Bend are to be shot according to an ordinance adopted by the city council.

The rabies situation, which made the ordinance necessary, led the council to declare that an emergency existed and to pass the ordinance through its various stages of one session. As an additional precaution the council directed the recorder to request the county health board to order dogs to be muzzled in the county in general.—Bend Bulletin.

New Power Company

A. A. Flynn, electrical engineer for the Rogue River Public Service Corporation, was in town Wednesday. This corporation has submitted a proposition to the city council to furnish Ashland with electric current in wholesale quantities. The corporation has a plant at Gold Hill which at present is generating 500 electrical horsepower and which is being enlarged so as to generate an additional thousand horsepower. It is furnishing Gold Hill with a portion of its lights and also has a proposition under consideration by the Medford council of somewhat the same nature as that proposed here. Mr. Flynn tells us that if his company can land the Ashland and Medford contracts they will immediately enlarge their plant so as to produce 7,000 horsepower. The Beaver Portland Cement Company is a customer of this company.—Ashland Tidings.

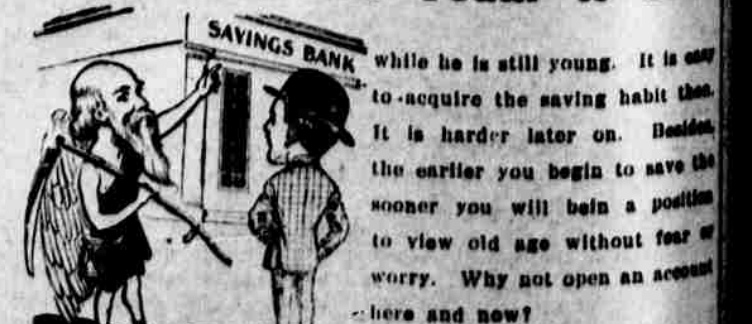
