SOME MINOR WAR NEWS FROM EUROPE

LITTLE STORIES FROM THE FRONT THAT ARE COMING IN THROUGH THE CAPITALS OF THE NATIONS NOW FIGHTING EACH OTHER—SOME ARE TRIVIAL, BUT ALL ARE INTERESTING AT THIS TIME.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—(By mail to New York)—Lady Smith-Dorrien, wife of Sir Horace Lockwood Smith-Dorrien, commanding the second British army corps, has made an appeal on behalf of the horses, whose needs in the present war have been all but overlooked by the people of England.

"War without horses would be impossible," she writes, "and the frightful loss caused by modern weapons is creating a shortage in horses absolutely unprecedented. It behooves all, therefore, to do their utmost not only to endeavor to save as many horses as possible for patriotic reasons, but because it is our duty also to endeavor to ease the sufferings of these poor, faithful animals."

The Blue Cross fund, while the French government has officially recognized its existence and gratefully accepted its offer of help for the horses.

The French minister of war has not only authorized the installation of horse hospitals in France, but has given every possible facility to the Blue Cross for carrying out its work. The Blue Cross hopes to open light base hospitals for wounded horses during this month.

LONDON, Jan. 4.—(By mail to New York).—Tragic experiences of a survivor of a mined steamer were related when the steam trawler Remagio landed at Grimsby, a Swede named Nelson, one of the crew of the Danish steamship Marie, which

was blown up by a German mine in the North Sea.

After the disaster the crew escaped from the sinking ship in two life boats, seven in each. The captain's boat was picked up by the Wilson liner Juno. Nelson was in the mate's boat, which in the darkness and rough sea, became separated from the other boat. Though they had food, the bitter cold and the repeated drenchings by waves caused the men in the boat terrible sufferings.

On the second day one man went mad and jumped overboard, and later two others collapsed and were washed out of the boat. The same night a fourth and fifth man died, leaving Nelson and the mate alone. The next day the mate succumbed, and Nelson was left tossing in a boat half full of water. At night he saw a trawler's lights and shouted with all his strength, and faintly when he heard the fishermen's answering calls.

branches and many other subjects will be taught with the aid of films. Pupils will be enrolled as in other schools.
